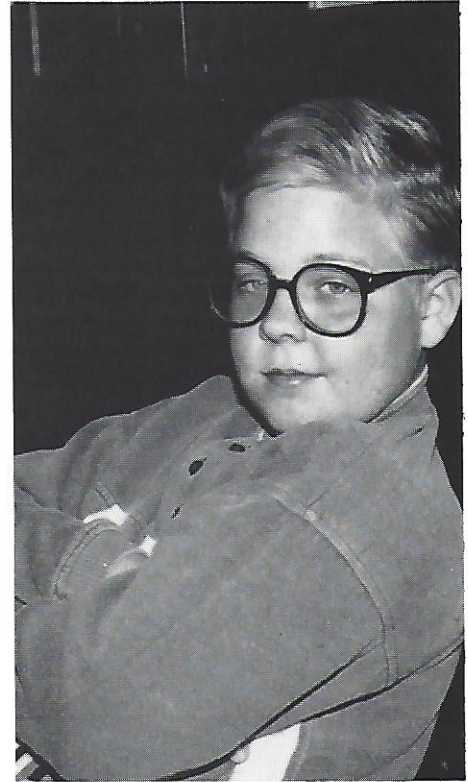

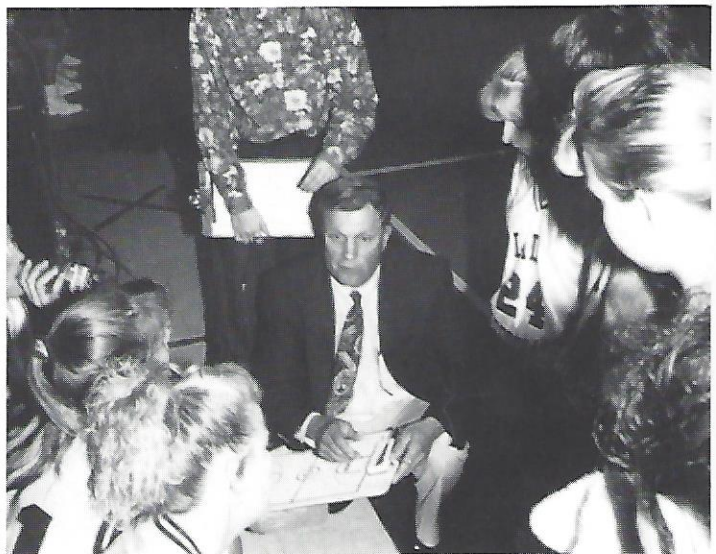
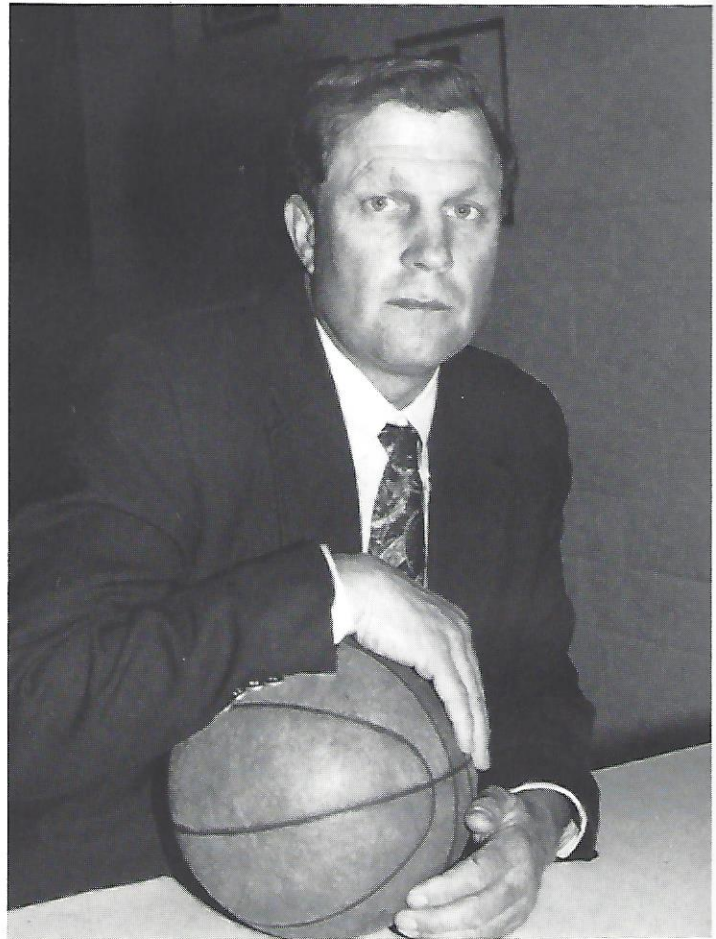
Coach Hutto has coached the girls softball team since 1988. The team has won conference trophies and advanced to top honors in 1993 as Class A State Champions.

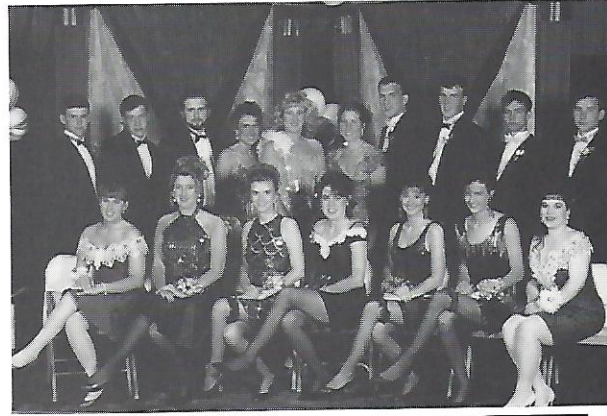

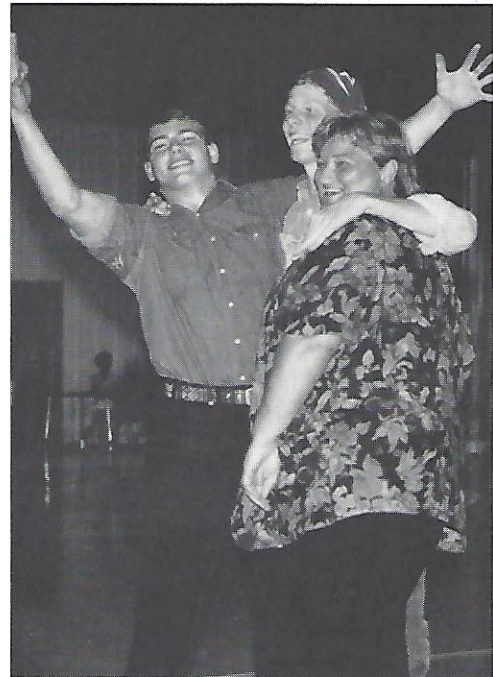

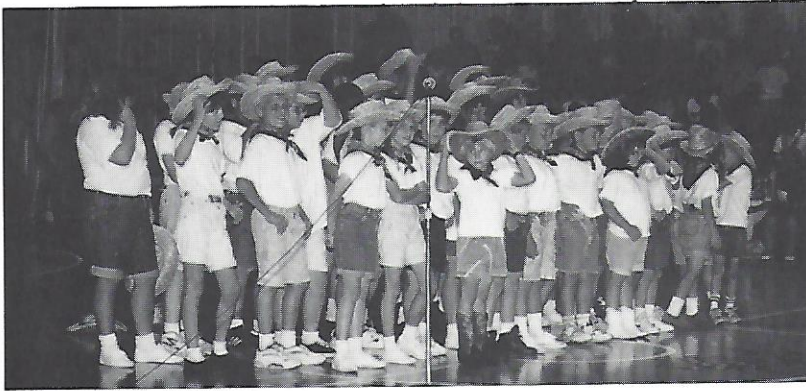

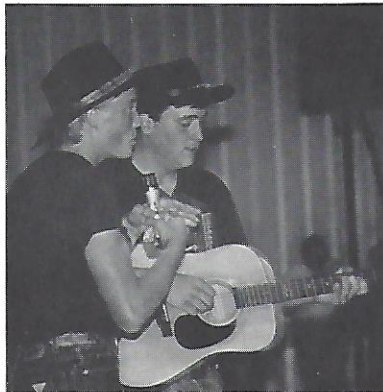

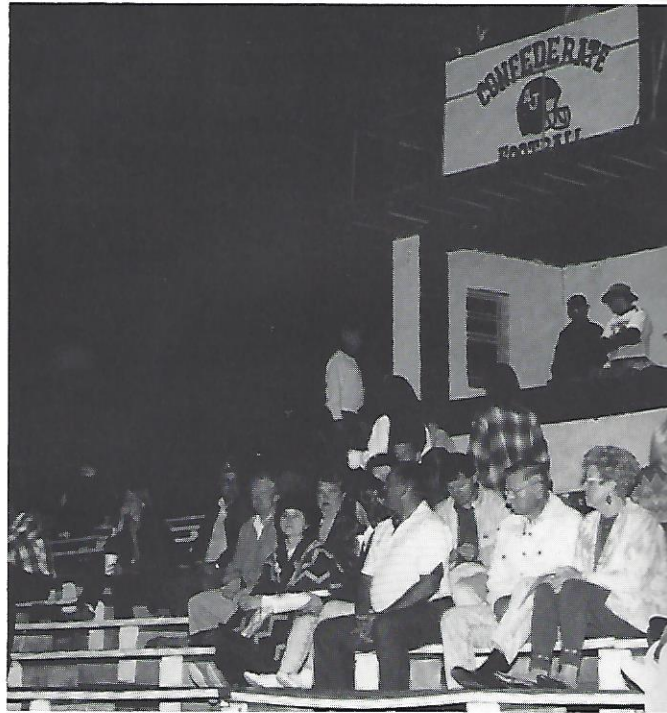


Homecoming 1993

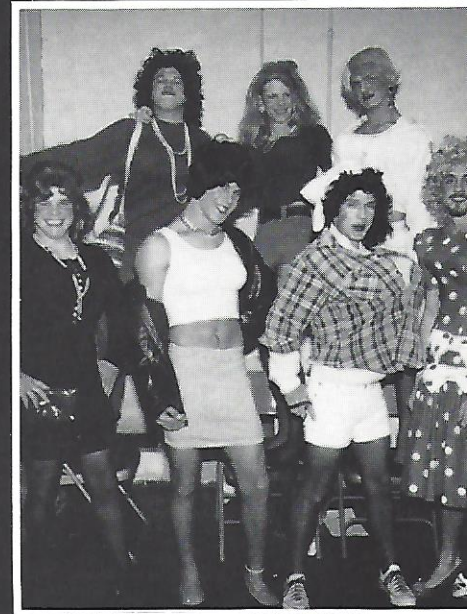

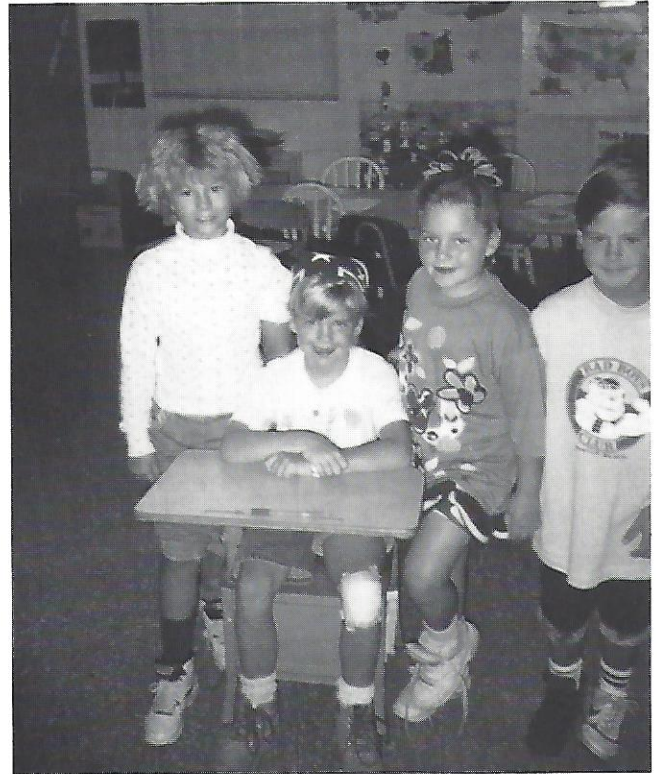

The thing they like to do most is play so they look forward to both recess times.

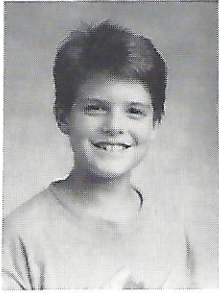

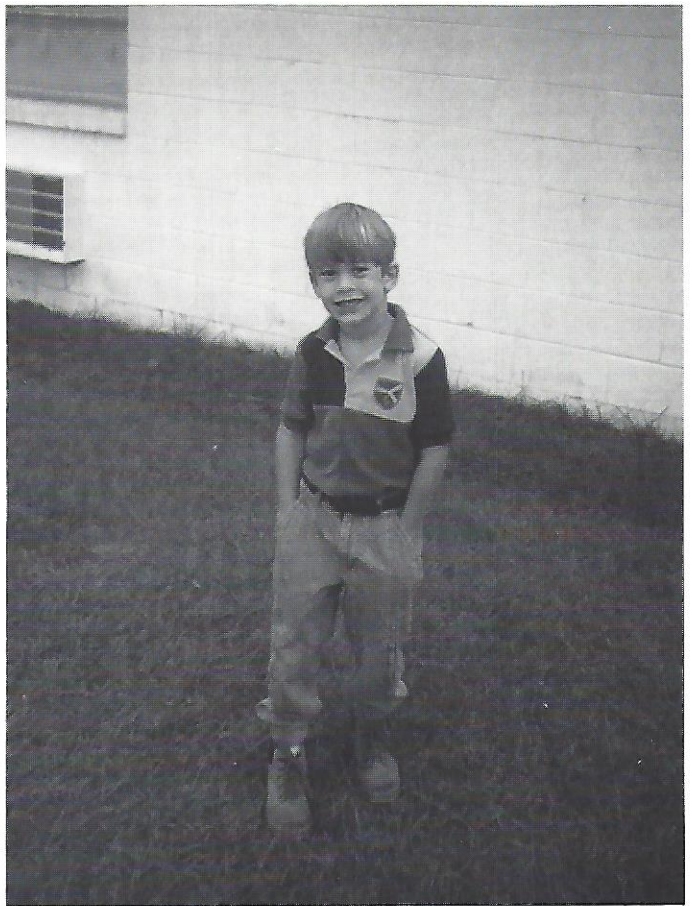
Everyone in the sixth grade has their own opinion about moving to high school. Some are glad they have another year as the "big kids" on grammar school end.

The Class of '99 also enjoys being an important part of the JV sports program. Participating in extra-curricular activities helps you feel like a more important part of the AJA family.

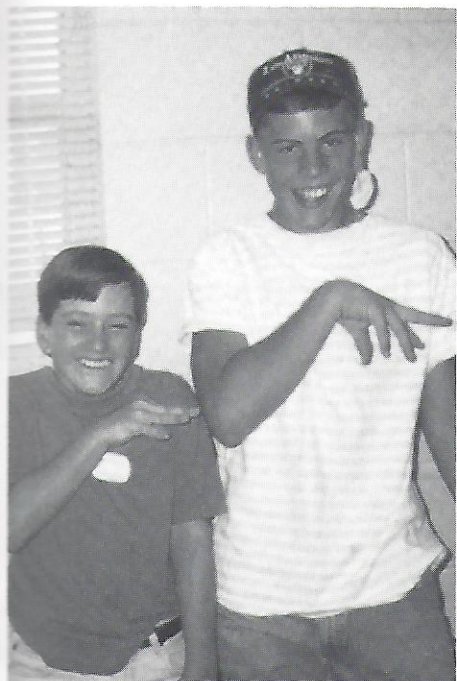

Most of the year Juniors work very hard trying to get everything done but it pays off in the end.

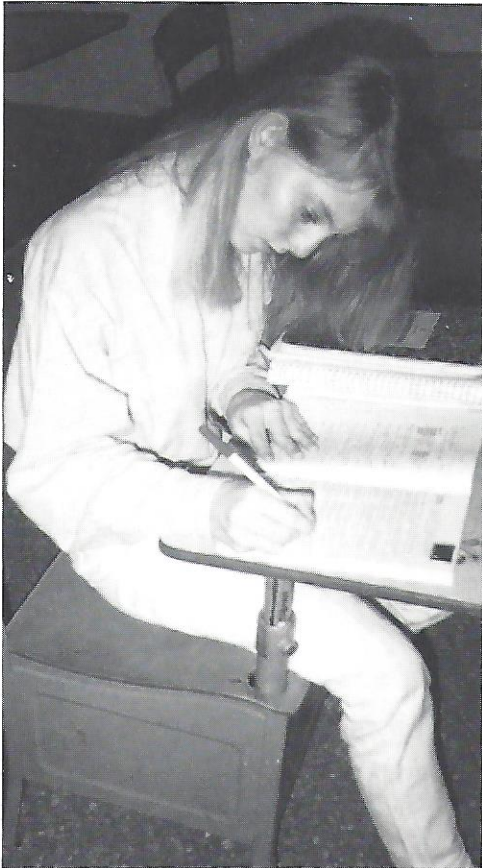

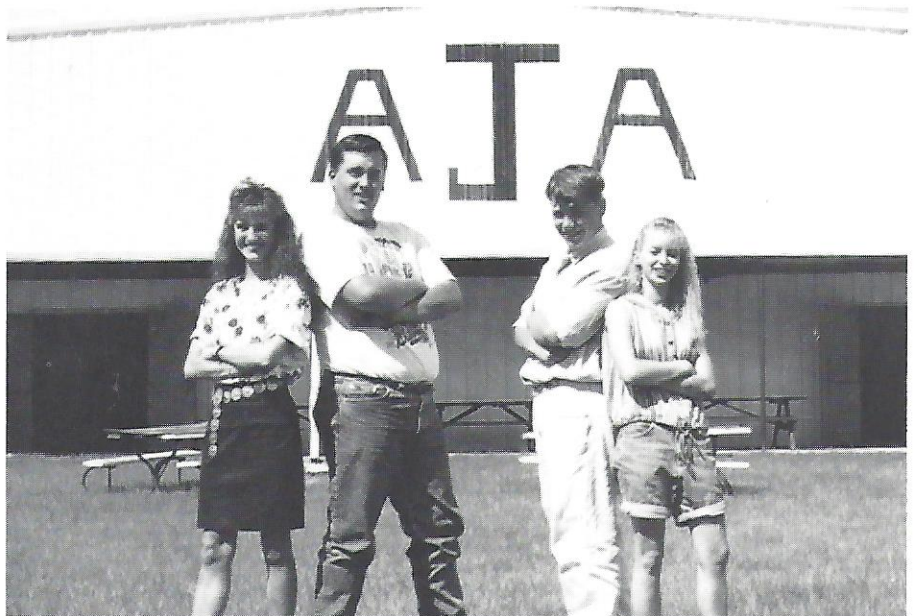

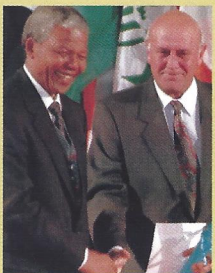

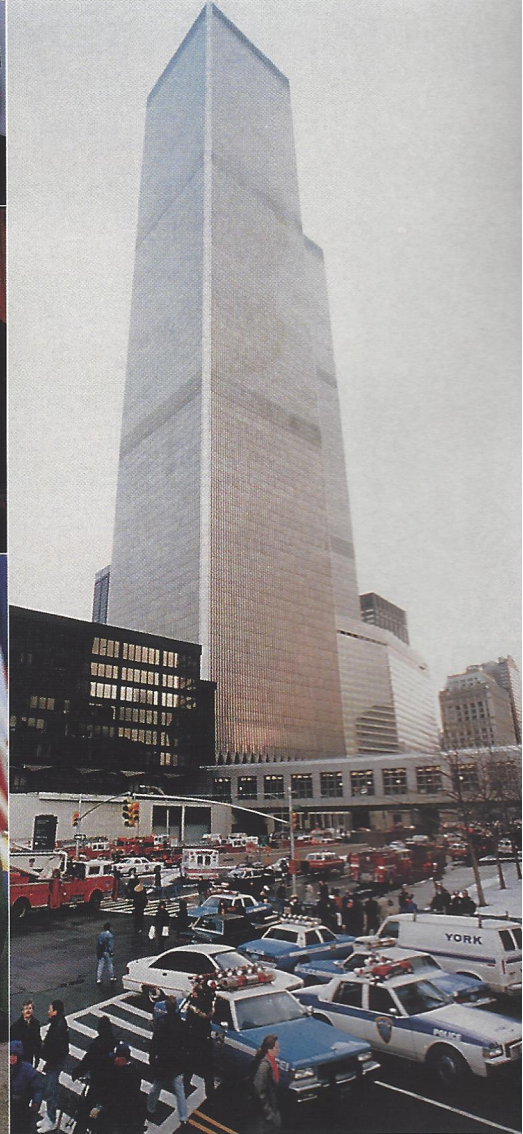

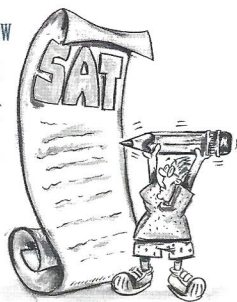
