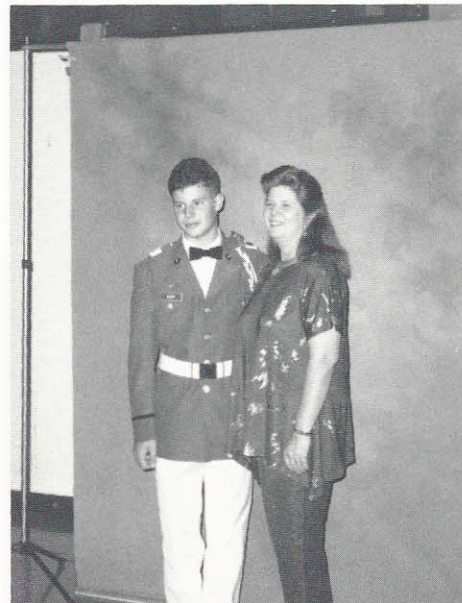


Visitors' Day weekend is highlighted by *Saturday Night Dance*
