

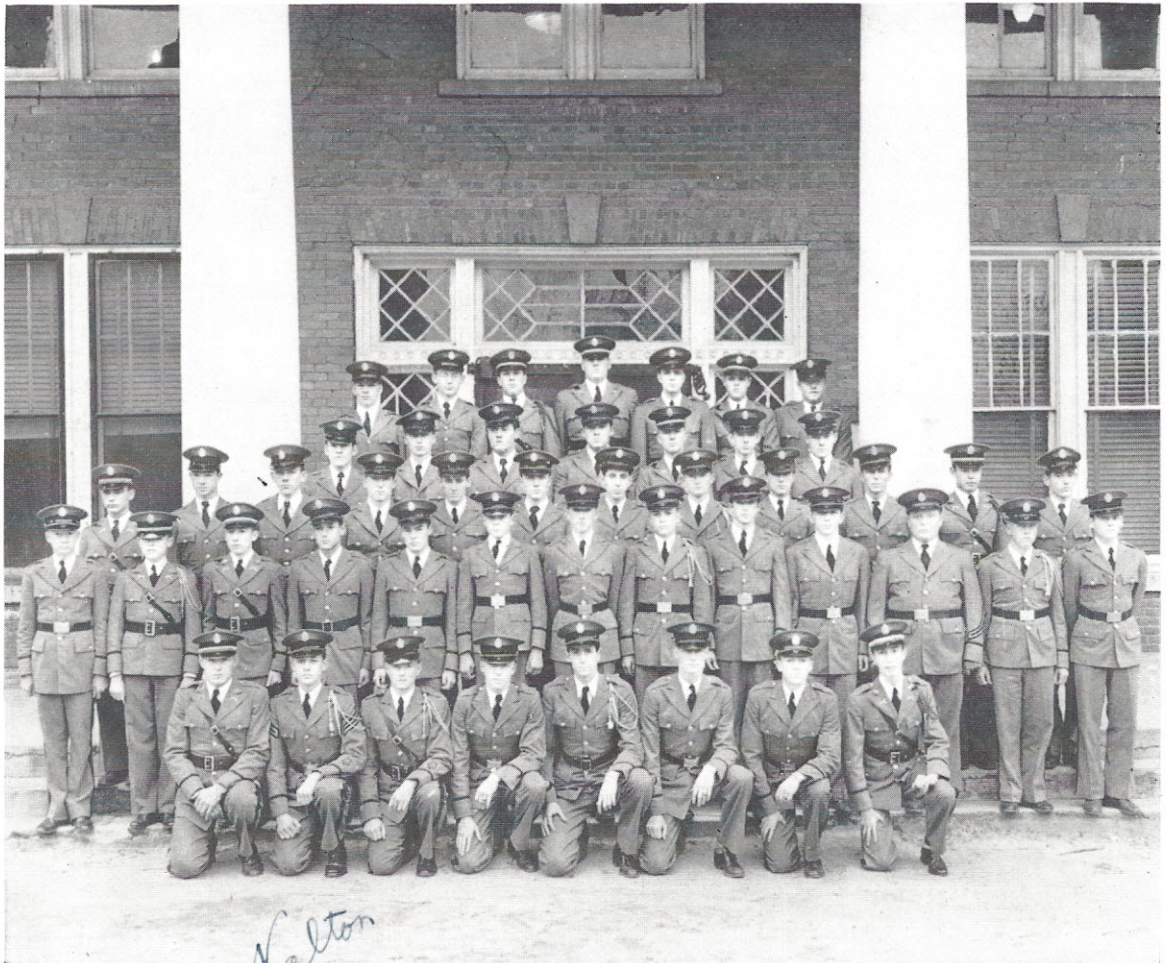
Literary Society
