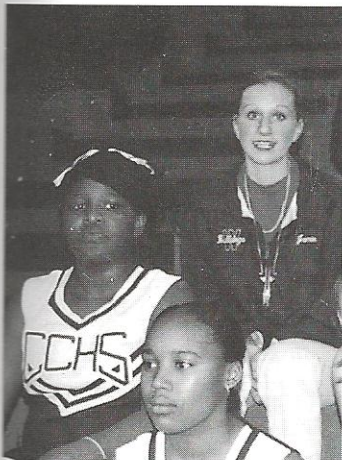
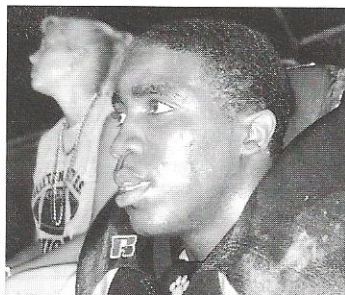

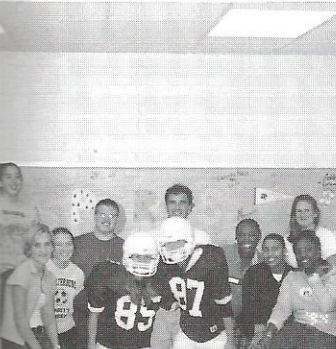


Good Lookin' Out. Sophomore P.J. Copeland watches over an exhausted looking Calvin Holmes. She was one of the very versatile and hard working football managers.

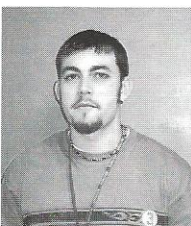
Being a trainer isn't all that bad. I have been a trainer all four years. If I wasn't a trainer, I would play softball or volleyball.
