

The Few, The Proud, The Students.

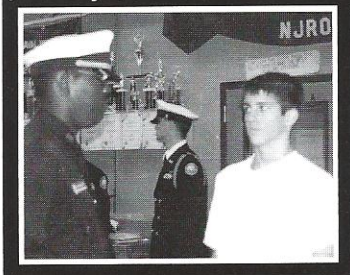

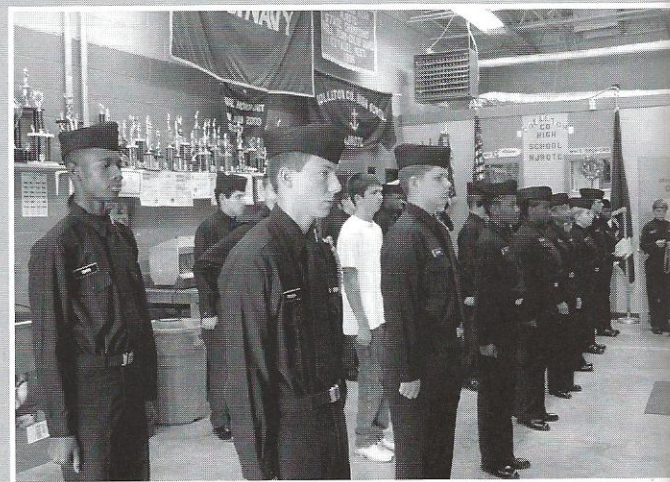
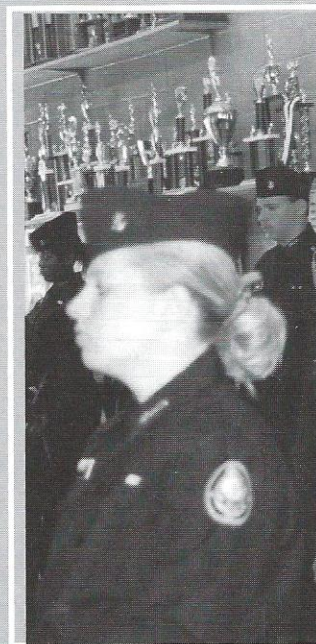


Looking frightened sophomore **Jeffrey Janes** gets scolded by his commander. Sometimes the instructors could be strict.
