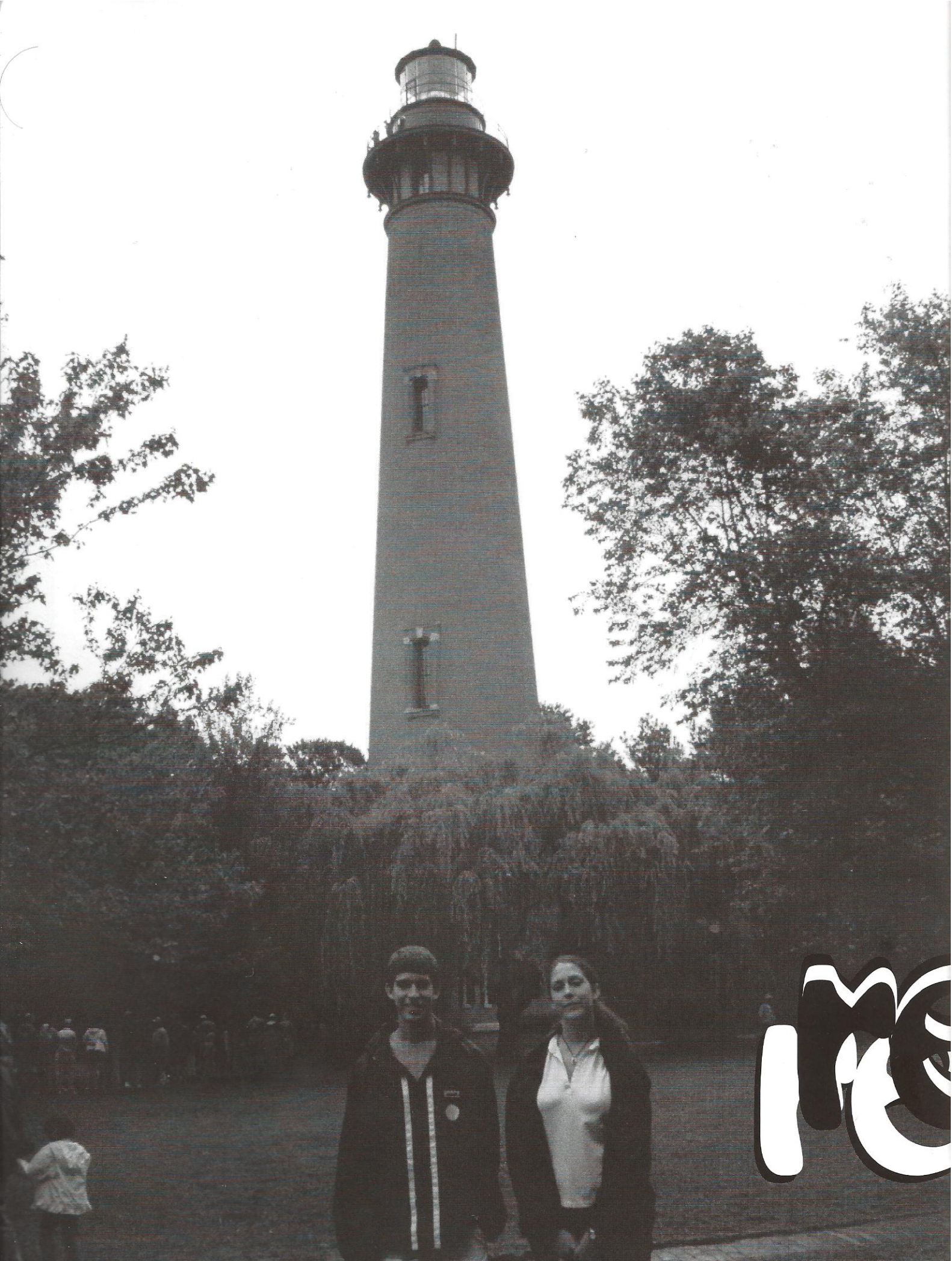
James concentrates on catching z's. "It is my favorite way to pass time," freshman James Hadaway said. The library was awefully quiet and snoozing was hard to resist.

"Getting the job done to the best of my ability is important to me," Mr. Youmans said. He normally walked the halls making sure students were on time to class.

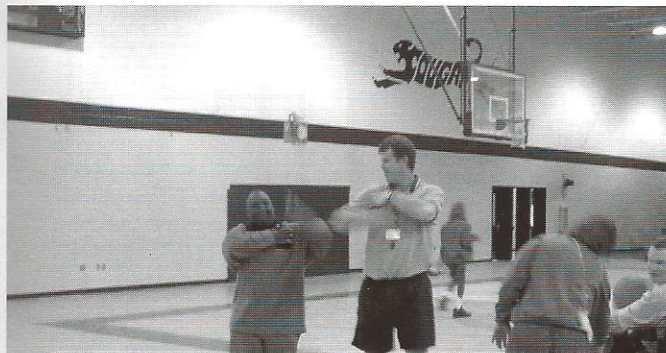

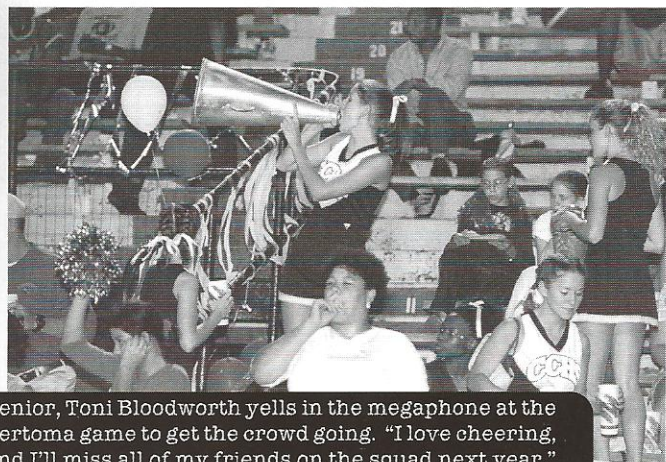

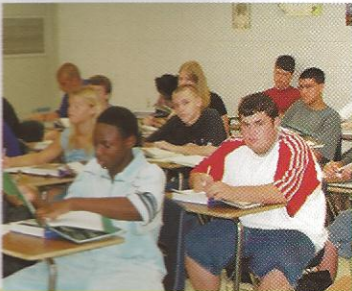

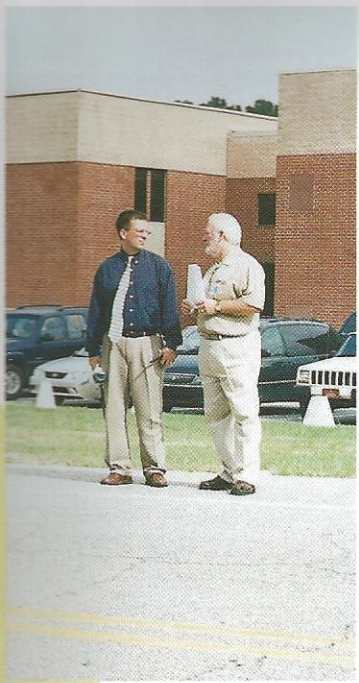

"I wore the crown on hat day because it fits my personality. All the girls bowed down," sophomore **Justin Reeves** said.



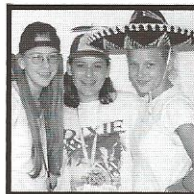

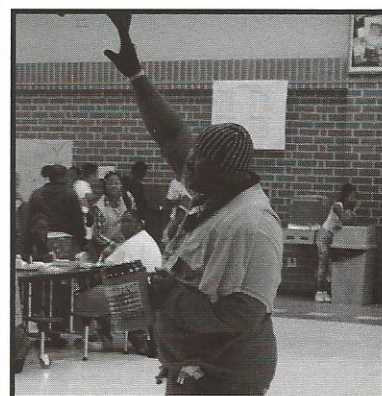

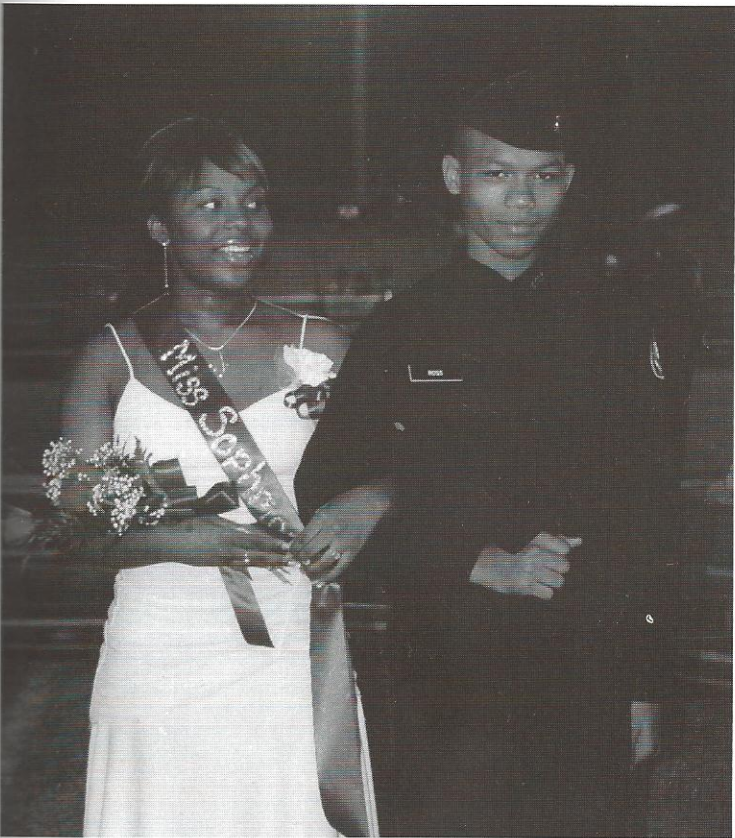

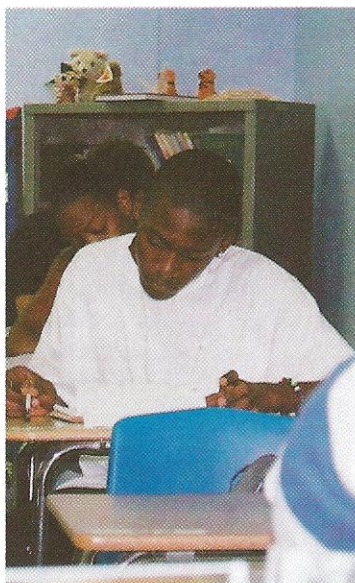

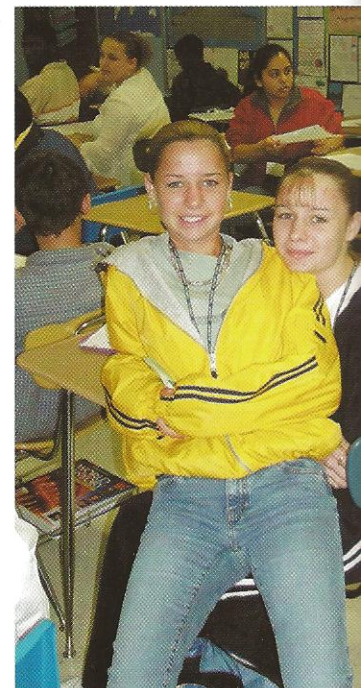

"Having a twin is great because if I miss an assignment she'll be there to get it, and we can share lots of stuff," freshman **Brittany Williams** said.

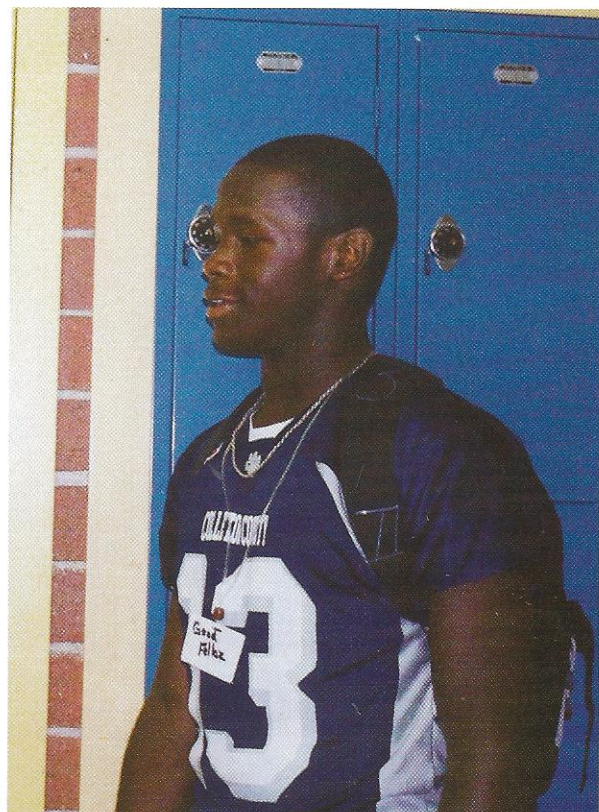

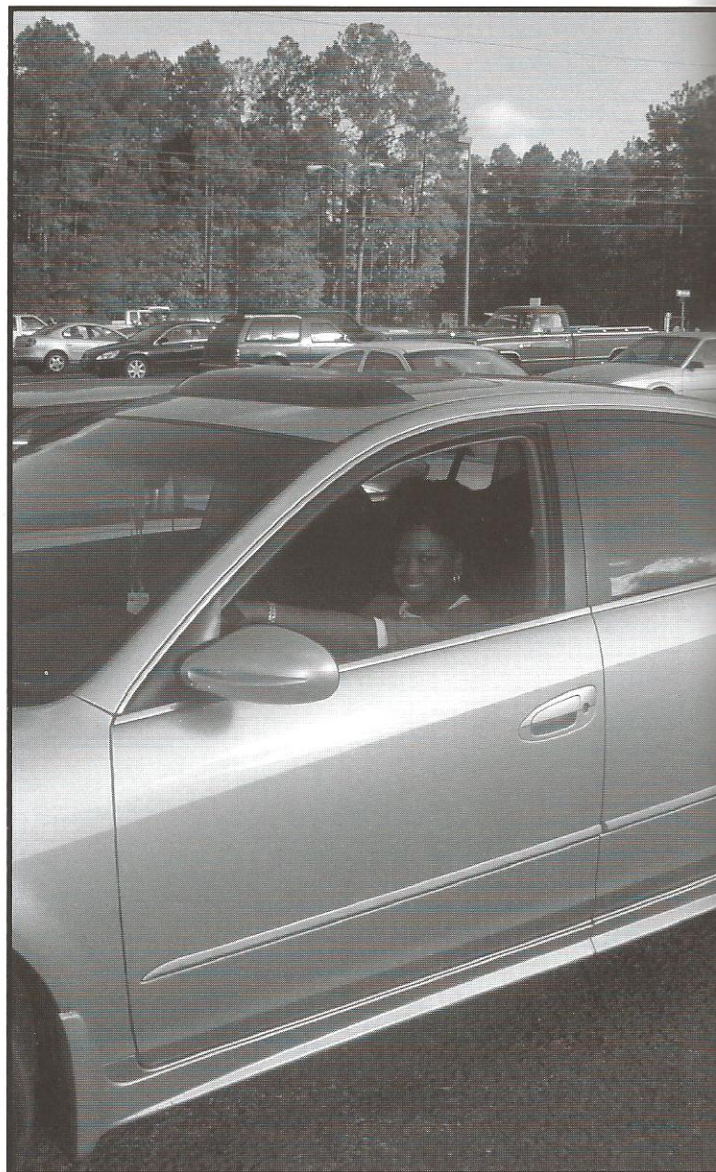

"The accident had a big impact on my life because I totally lost my car and I had to go to so many doctors," Sylvia said.

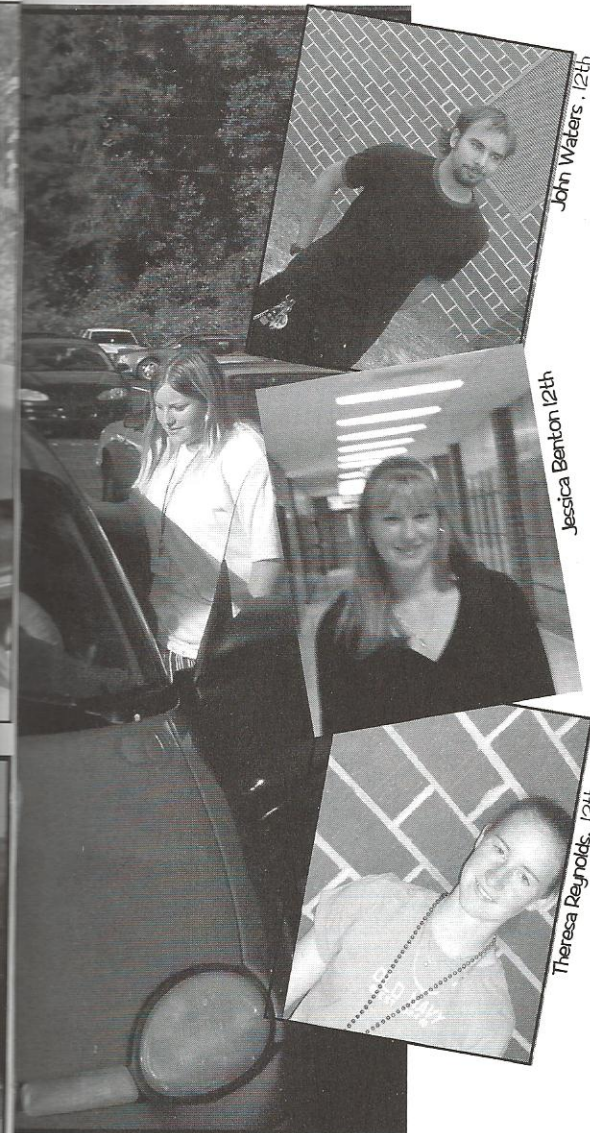
The doctors gave her tests and x-rays, that didn't allow her to go home until 9:30 p.m.

Let the quest for cash begin. Some students enjoyed working, usually because they craved money. "Money is pretty," freshman **Wesley Davis** said.

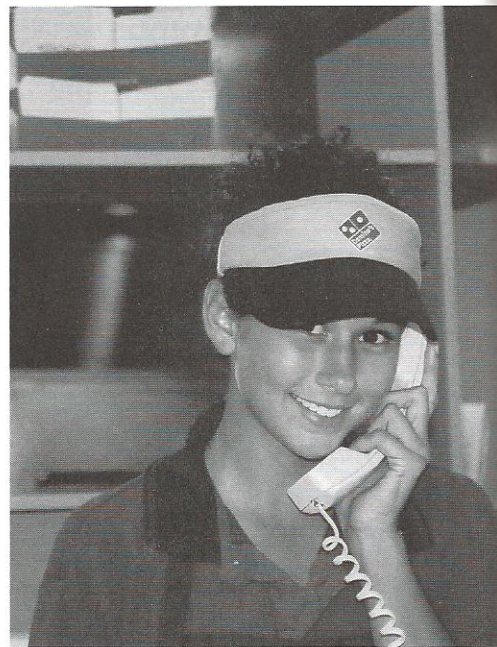
However, a portion of students did their job for selfless reasons. "[Doing my job] is worth it because it keeps the wilderness clean," sophomore **Paul Hornych** said.

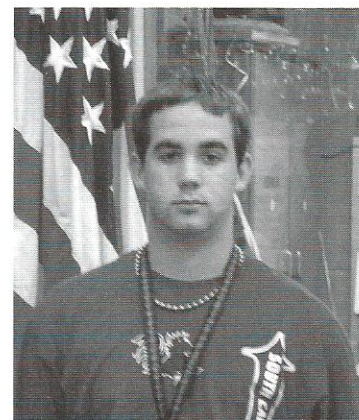

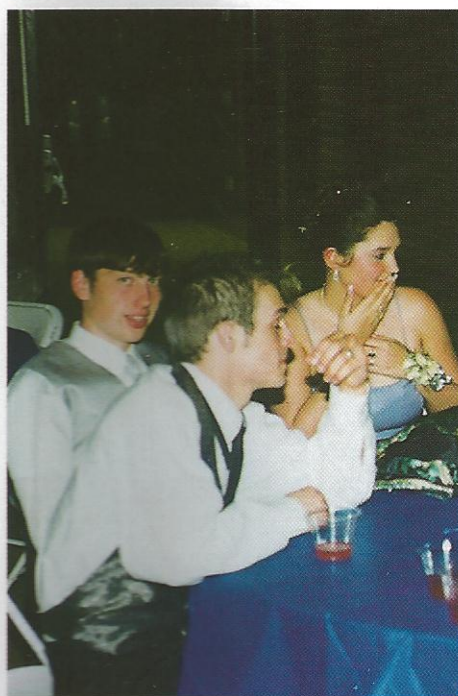
A lot went into getting everything ready for prom. This included teachers taking time out of their day to help deco-

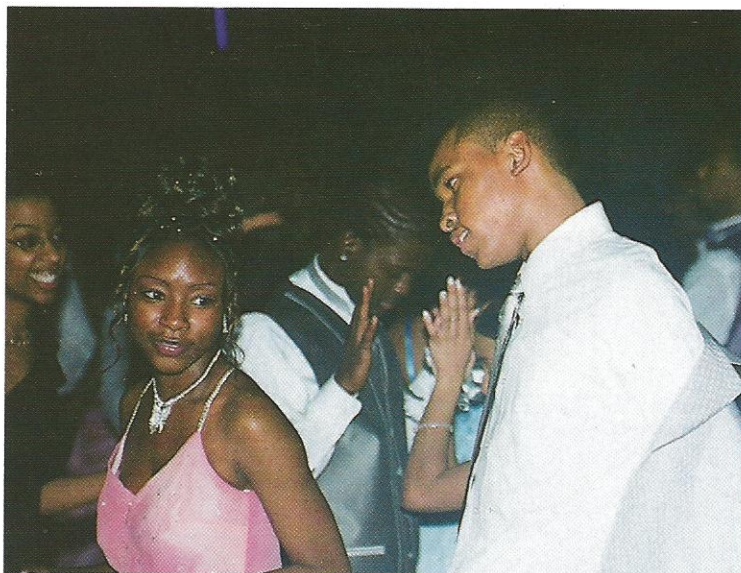

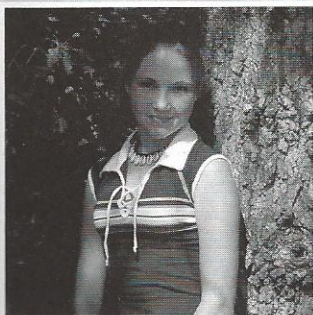

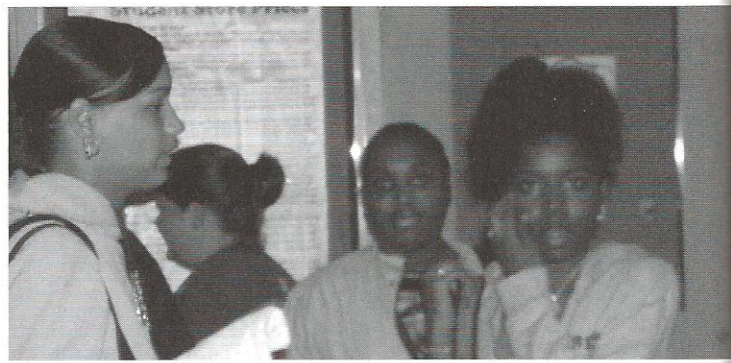

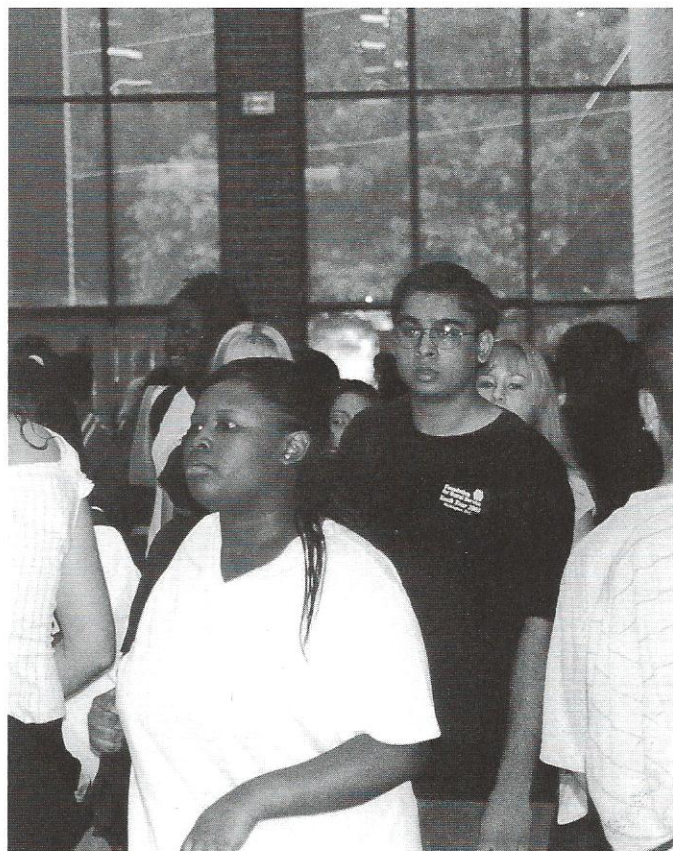
The Time Is Here, The Time Is Now

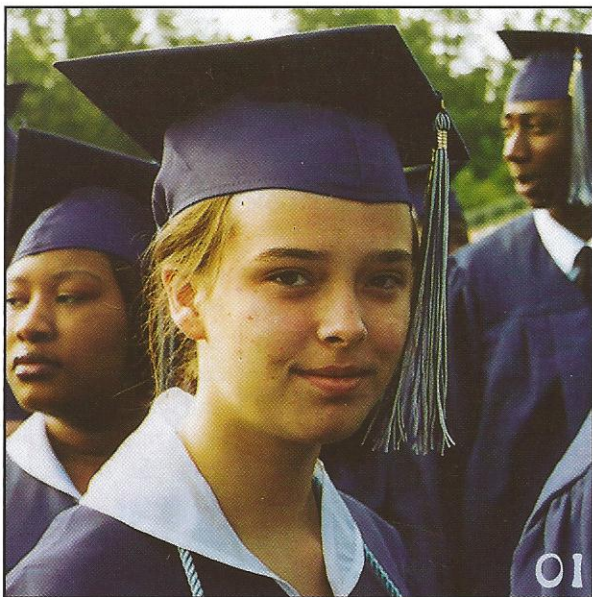
Many differences changed our educational system. For instance, the warning bell no longer existed. "I don't like the fact

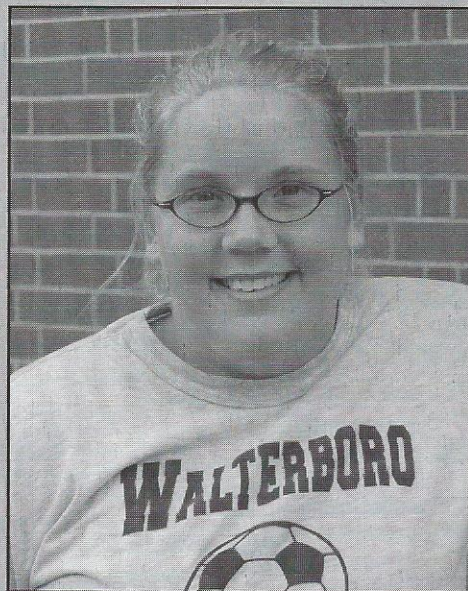
Runnin' the Show & Competin' for Dough

The National Honor Society is a group of young students that help the community to be a better place to live. With a GPA of 3.7 or higher, these students earned their right to be in NHS.

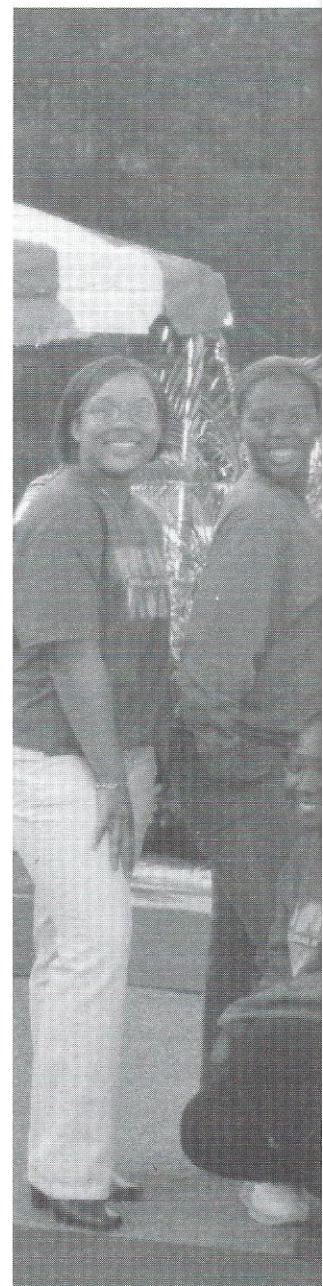

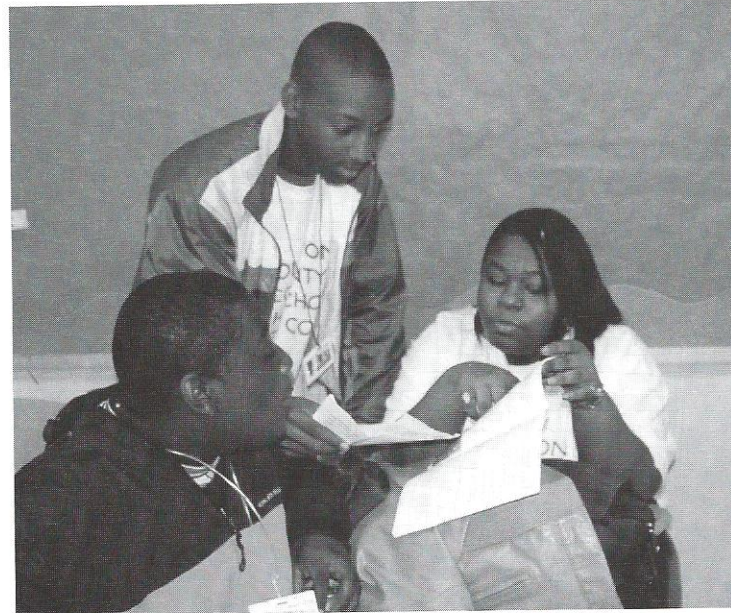

Though they did not make it to the championship, most agreed that they had a great year.

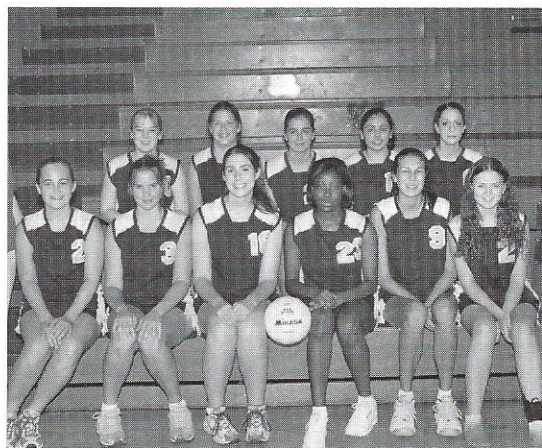

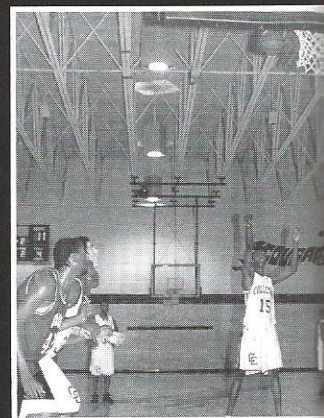
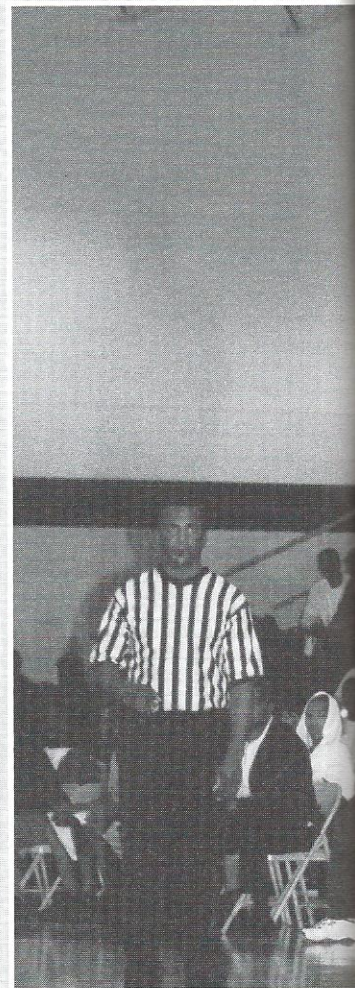
One of the biggest things that kept the team going consisted of good grades and decency.

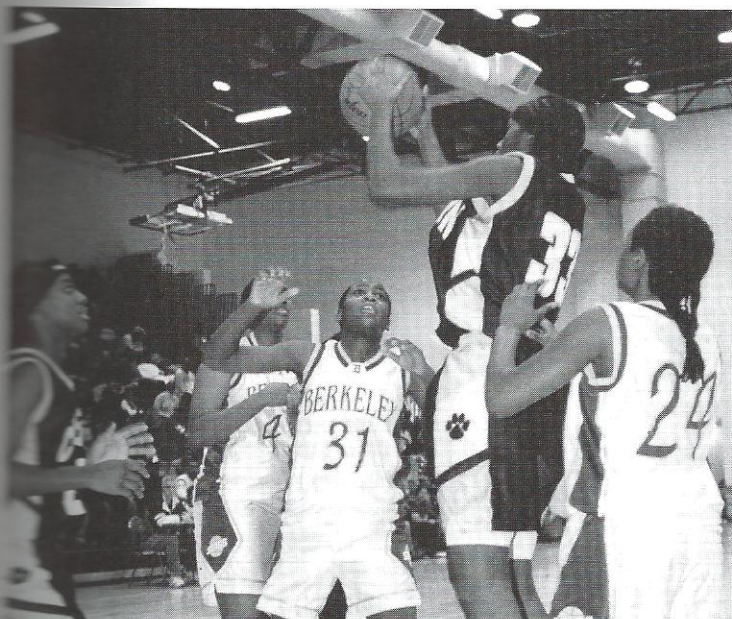

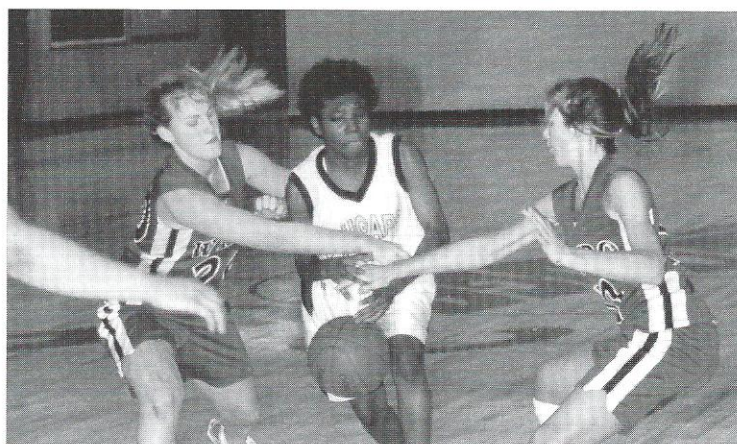

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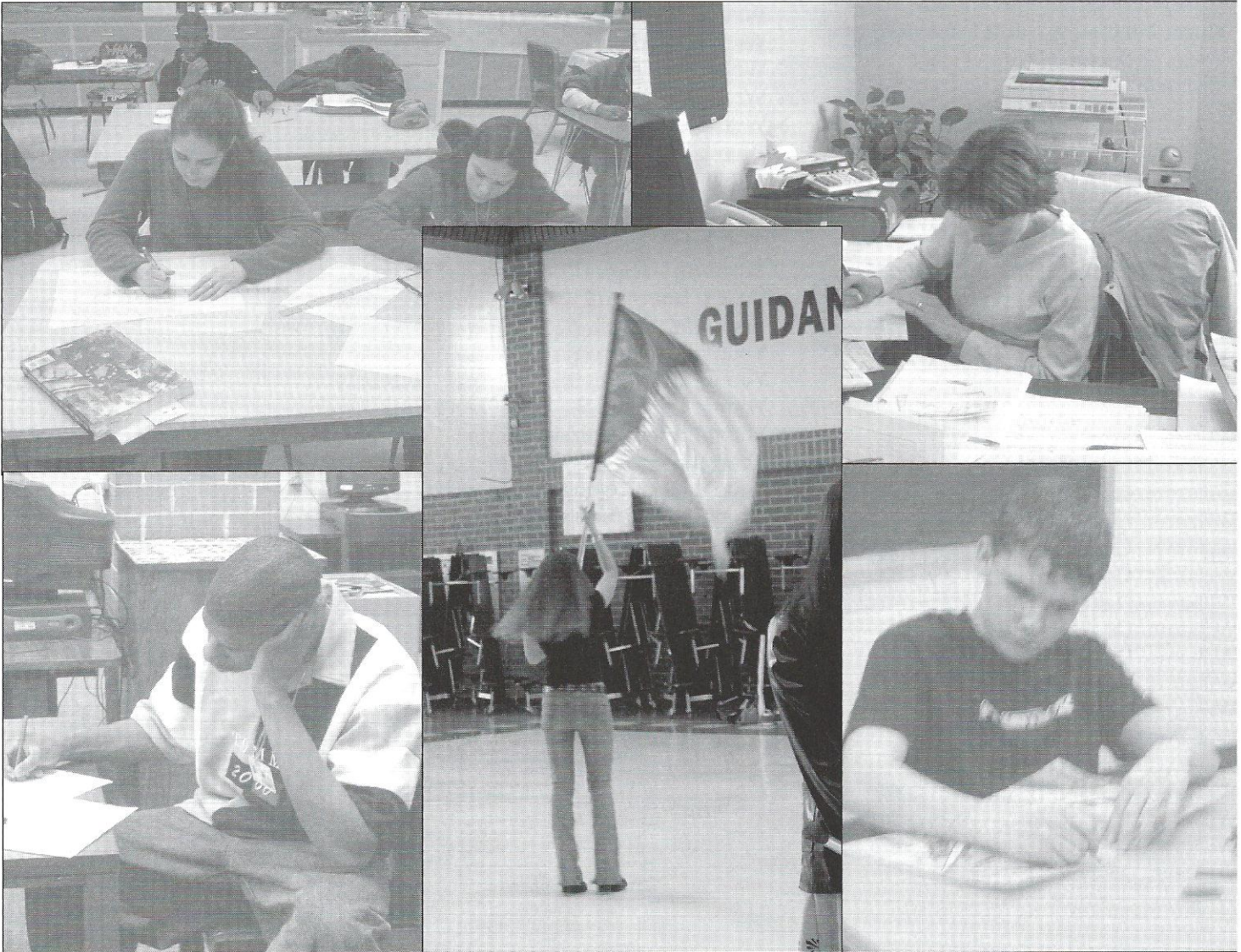
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LIFE LESSONS LEARNED
