




The only annoying thing about having a twin came along

However, a portion of students did their job for selfless reasons. "[Doing my job] is worth it because it keeps the wilderness clean," sophomore Paul Hornvach said.





Many differences changed our educational system. For instance, the warning bell no longer existed. "I don't like the fact




The academic year got underway and so did the student council, beginning with Penny Wars for Relay for Life, which supported people that had Cancer. Student Council continued to become active through-


Students sometimes joined to obtain a sense of discipline and respect for authority. "NIROTO is a class where you can learn responsibility and good leadership." freshman leftry



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
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
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








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
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
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LIFE LESSONS LEARNED
