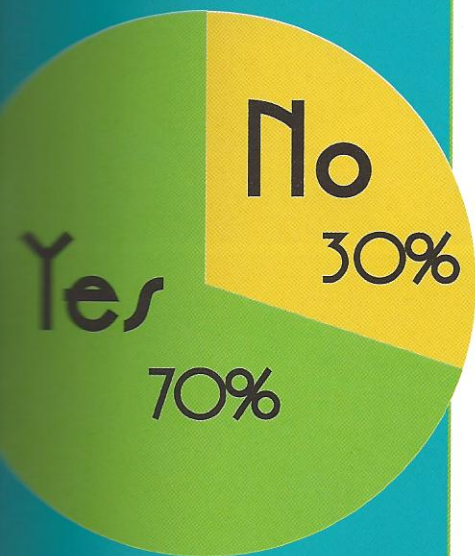

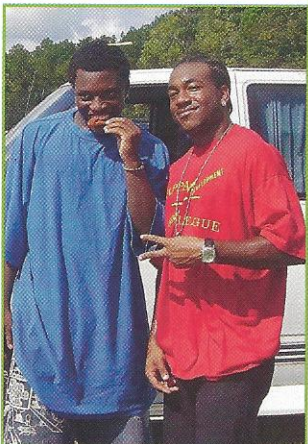
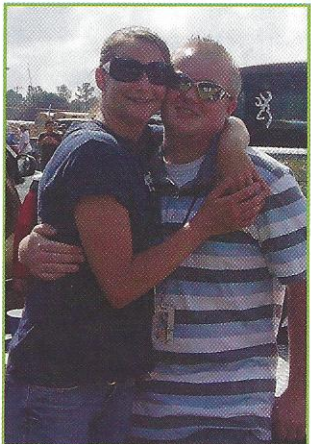


Who's Bringing What?
