





The newly founded Science Club is stepping up to the challenge of a cleaner and safer environment. The Science Club has adopted a two mile stretch of Academy Road.







During lunch, student council members Perry Hunt and Travis Folk attend the student council meetings every week. They voice their opinions on moneyraising projects and other fun-filled activities.








The club participates in the Adopt-a-Highway program by cleaning up the roads near Colleton Prep. These students spent Saturday morning helping with this community project.

Special organizations for special people





When the school year ends, and we go our separate ways, remember - this book of memories was created by a staff that was SIMPLY THE BEST!






The TALON's editors balance their time between schoolwork and their dedication to our yearbook. This special group of girls puts much time and effort into making this yearbook the best it can be.





On October 31st another special day is celebrat-







Special people show excellence through leadership





College decisions and AP exams also influenced senior life, and as decisions for their futures were made, they knew the final countdown had begun.


A Senior's work is never done!

They often feel as though all the compositions, homework, and tests will never be finished. Frustration, hard work and determination will all pay off when the Seniors hold their diplomas.





Friends Are Friends Forever.





has become a special gathering place for the Seniors before and during lunch. Usually the girls are on the phone, however Andy Blevins makes a call that has all the guys curious.











Mrs. Howell is always willing to give her time to help students in need. Great teachers like this are hard to find.





"Why?" and "how?" are important words in any science class, whether it be biology, or physics. Science experiments allow students to find the answers to those questions.





"Will I ever use this?" is a question commonly heard by math teachers. The answer is yes! Math is becoming increasingly more important due to changes in the SAT and increased competition for college acceptance. Students must master basic math skills before entering high school to prepare them for more advanced math and science.

The Saxon math series, now used in kindergarten and grades five through eight, is an incremental development program that uses repetition to help the students learn. New concepts are used along with old concepts and they are

practiced several times. This allows the students to become completely familiar with the concept and they are able to apply it to new problems.

In order to interest their students in math, some teachers let their students do math related puzzles and games. Math is an important part of life and the teachers at CPA are working hard to insure that their students will be prepared.

accreditation from SCISA

Accreditation means not only that the school is meeting standards, but also that we are committed to improving the quality of our programs. Mr. Quarles

In November, the hard work that the faculty, students, and parents put into Colleton Prep was once again recognized. The school was awarded the level of advanced accreditation from the S.C. Independent School Association. Of the members of SCISA, only about 10 percent achieve this level.

A team of teachers, headmasters, and college professors evaluated the school in all areas, including teachers, facilities, administrative policies and student achievement. For two days. the evaluation team observed classes, toured the facilities and even ate food from the school's lunch room. They then met with the student council. The team found that CPA had excellent programs, an innovative curriculum, a strong athletic program, and respect between students and teachers.




A Change In Tradition




SCOUTS


































The Hawks' desire to win and their ability to work together led them through a good season.








