Difference in personalities help develop flexibility within the class



Miss Rooney, fifth grade teacher, believes in mixing fun with work. While working on proportions in math, the class made a lifesize gingerbread man.




Growing rapidly brings necessary maturity to face new academic challenges


First





"Kindergarten teachers never grow up!" stated Gail Howell, as she joins her eager students on the swings.













year. We will be better and more experienced than we are now," stated Perry Hunt.




































Besides teaching, raising a family, and other activities, teachers devote many hours toward furthering the education of their students.

Halloween Carnival.




Coach Brittle is another dedicated teacher. He is the athletic director at Colleton Prep. He also coaches football and baseball.

When questioned why she liked teaching English to the high school students. Mrs. Stone replied, "I enjoy watching and helping my students provide and plan for the future." Not only does Mrs. Stone teach here at CPA but she is also a tutor for students who need a bit of extra help for their studies. Mrs. Stone serves as the director of development and recruiting for the school. She provides information to the parents who are interested in sending their child to CPA.

Why limit learning to four walls and a chalkboard? This is the philosophy followed by CPA faculty. Teachers on all grade levels take advantage of any and all types of stimulating educational experiences.

In lower school where the learning experience is begun, enrichment classes expand the regular cirriculum. Art, taught by Mrs. Susan Street, teaches children to expand their creative thought in the classroom activities. Spanish, taught by Mrs. Sharon Folk, encourages Spanish culture and elementary Spanish skills, such as counting. Computer and library go handin-hand with the addition of the CD-program to the library. Mrs. Brightwell, media specialist, also teaches 6th and 7th grade library classes.

Sixth and seventh grade also benefitted from a semester of health taught in cooperation with P.E.

Mrs. Speaks, who teaches middle school English and Literature, has many responsibilities outside the classroom. She is in charge of the Spelling Bee and Conservation Essay. When asked why she teaches, she replied, "Being in a classroom is an exciting and enjoyable experience."







When asked why she feels the lower school grades are so important, Mrs. Davenport replied, "The elementary school provides a strong, sure foundation for a child's future learning. It can also shape his attitude toward school. At CPA, the elementary teachers encourage children to be the best they can be. They also strive to make learning a positive experience for each child."

Lower school life is the main foundation for a student's future education. These "formative years" are very important for beginning a well-rounded education. The children begin in kindergarten by learning the alphabet and then using that information to learn to read in the first grade. Kindergarten teacher Mrs. Howell said, "Teaching is fun because the children are so enthusiastic."

The new Saxon math program stresses hands-on activities using money and blocks. Students also learned more about angles, shapes, and lines. "This method is more practical and logical. The kids don't just memorize how to do something, they actually learn why they're doing it," said the second grade teacher, Mrs. Bolt. The second grade also added a little elegance to their writing by learning cursive.

With an increased emphasis on healthy safe environment for learning, many new students enrolled in the K program. This increased to three, the number of 5 year old classes. Mrs. Beth Smaok a new first grade teacher said, "I truly feel small classroom numbers greatly increase a child's potential to learn. With 14 students, I'm able to give more individualized attention when needed."

Many elementary students took advantage of the Learning Center where, each week, they worked with the teacher on specific areas needed by each child. The CD-ROM computer was a particularly effective tool.




