The senior class has come together through the years, and this togetherness will be remembered after graduation, when each student will go his separate way always remembering what made him a part of the Class of 1994.







Changing Ways




A Challenged Group








Changes Make






ACTIONS SPEAK


























A Lot Of Hard








The Time Of

The Wee Hawks and the B-Teams are important for the younger students to learn the basics they need to know to participate on the Junior Varsity teams.







The 1993-94 yearbook editors include students in grades 10 through 12 who give up much of their time to work on the yearbook.



This new organization proved to be a great success. Tyler White said, "My favorite part was being able to write letters and send them to my friends at school."






