

gun fights.



A joint effort by the Student Council, the PTO, and the senior Advanced Placement Composition class, the play was directed by Mrs. Debra Snyder.






Parent Teacher Organization


Herndon and Melanie Hoat valiantly organize class por trait days; and Cara Valentine—well, Cara smiles and rounds up the organization for last-minute photos.

Colophon

The 27th volume of the TALON, the official yearbook of Colleton Preparatory Academy, was designed and prepared by members of the 1996 TALON staff and faculty advisor, Mr. Dale Dittmer, using a Power Macintosh 6100/66 computer, Aldus PageMaker 5.0, and Jostens' Yeartech software program. The printing was done by Jostens Printing & Publishing in Clarksville, TN by the offset lithography process. All printing and cover production was done at this one facility. Jostens' local representative to CPA is Jack Young of Mt. Pleasant, S.C.

All 164 pages were printed on 80# double coated high gloss Mead enamel paper. The "WorldBeat" magazine section was prepared by WorldBook encyclopedia and Jostens and printed in full process color on 80# gloss enamel. The cover is custom designed litho pictorial with royal blue 287 and black tempo inks, and two units of special spangle foil application. Gloss laminated finish applied. The endsheets are 65# weight Snow white with #280 Transicolor with school design in black ink different from front and back.


