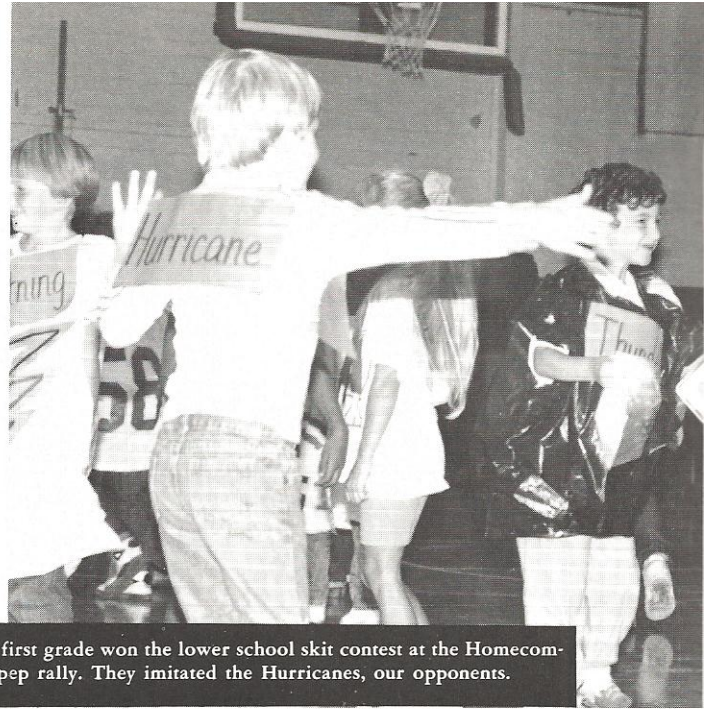
Aren't they lovely? Beauties Matt Free, Jamie Bryan, Drew Brightwell, and Buck Howell competed for the 1989 Homely Queen.

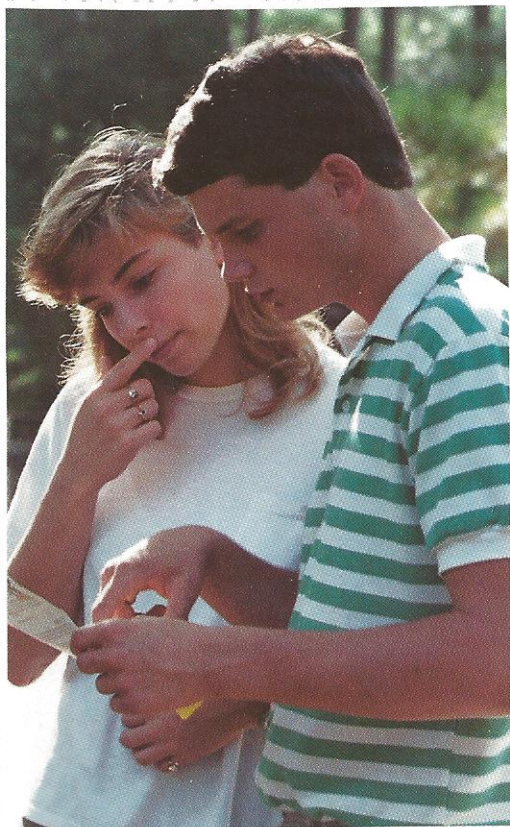
Wild And Wonderful

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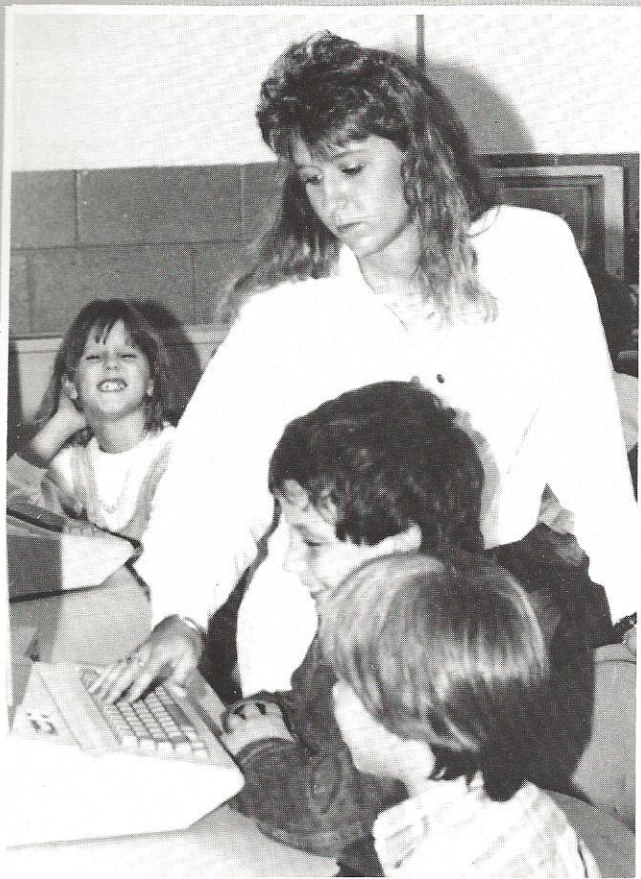

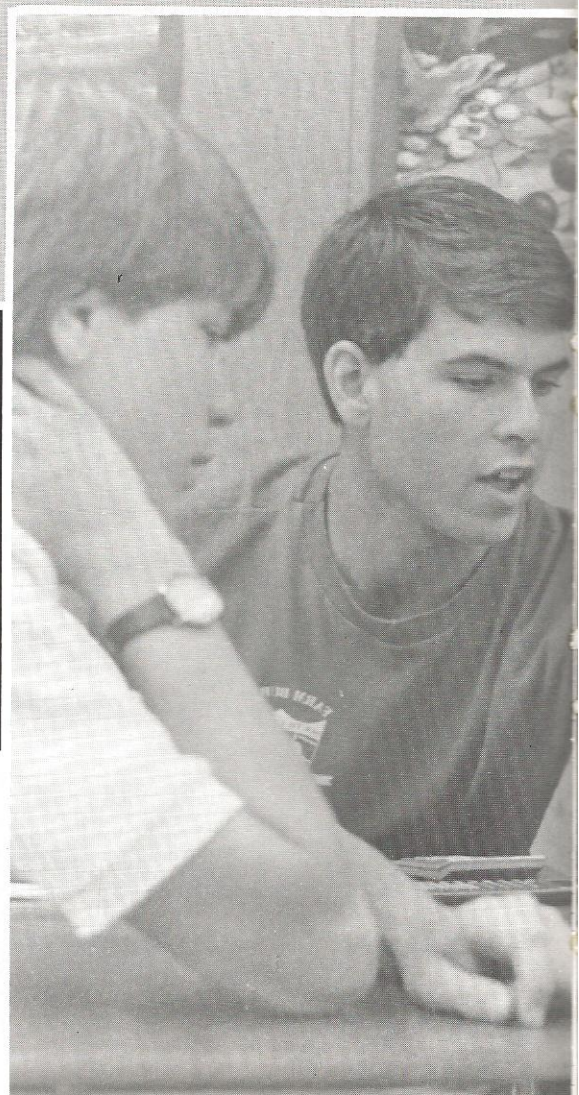
DAY BY DAY

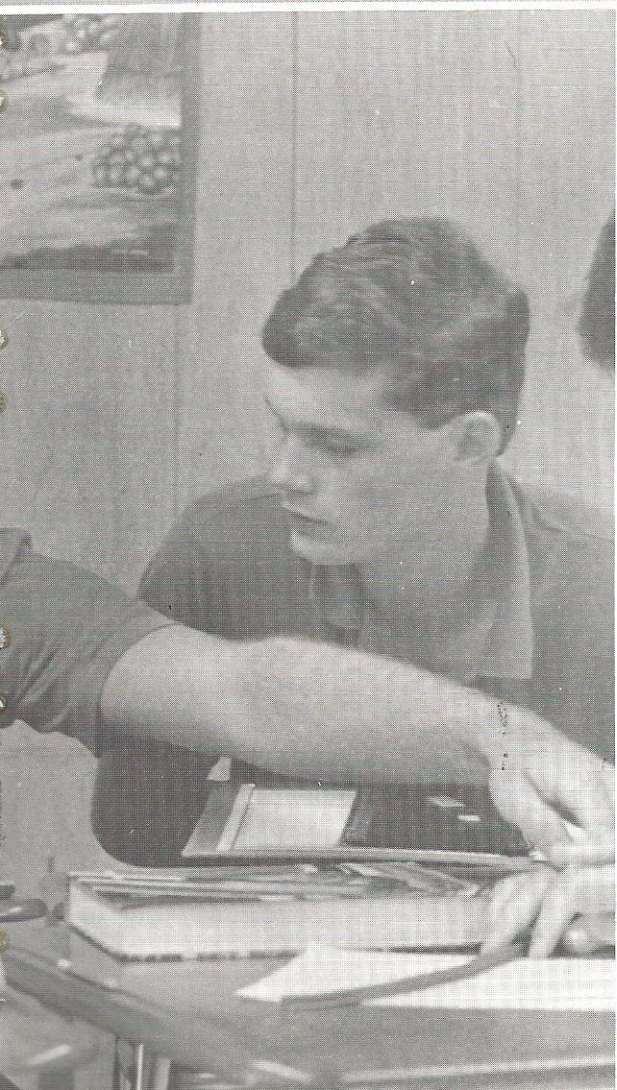

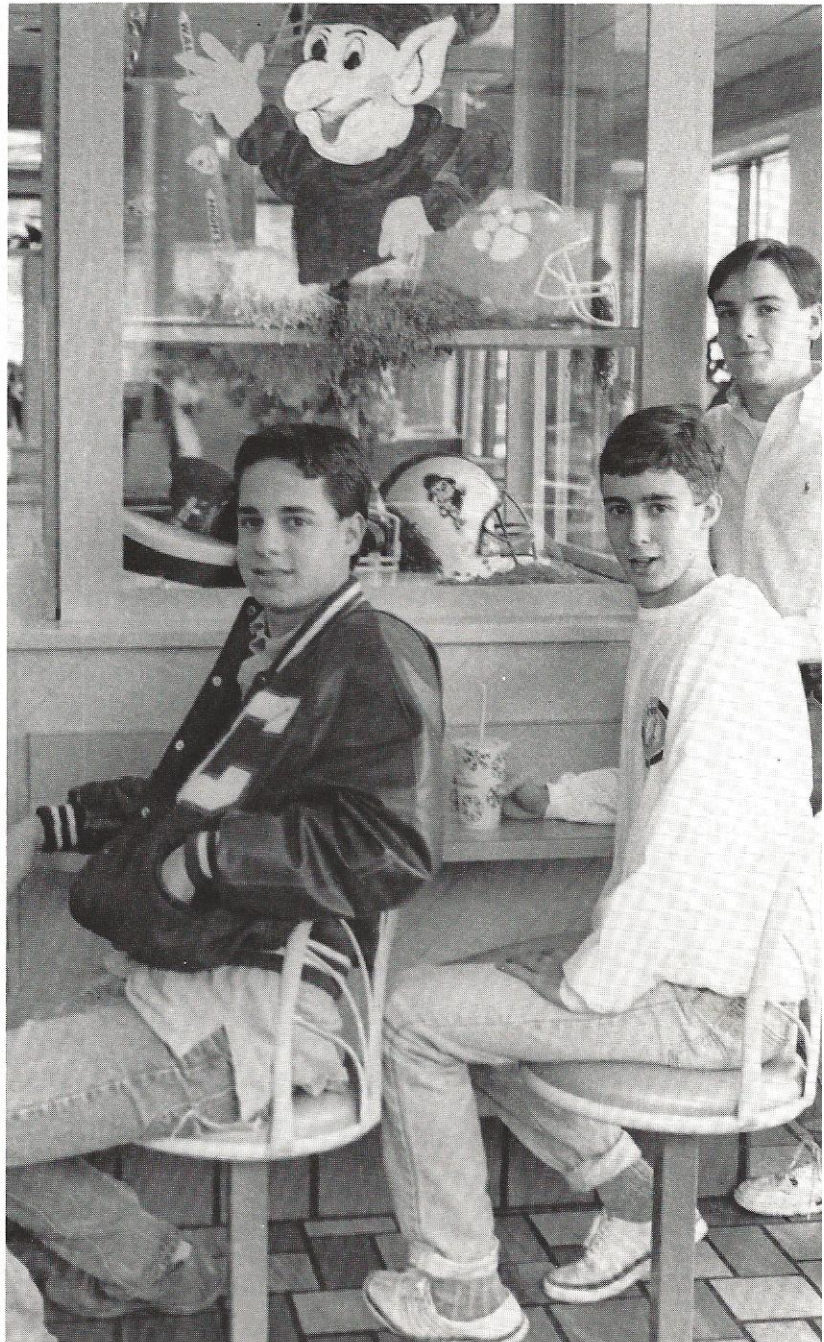

Laughter and good-natured teasing resound through the middle school building. It is not just a place for learning, but a place for friendships.

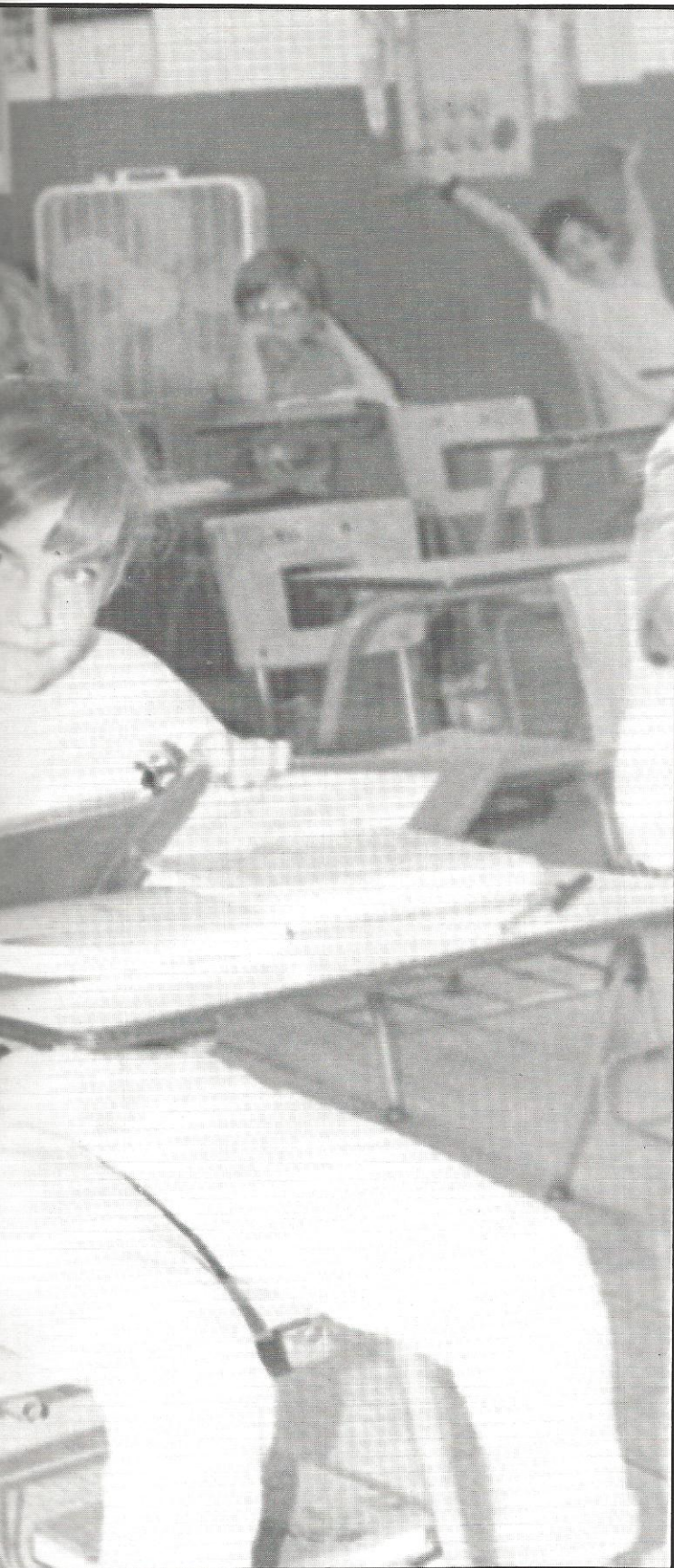

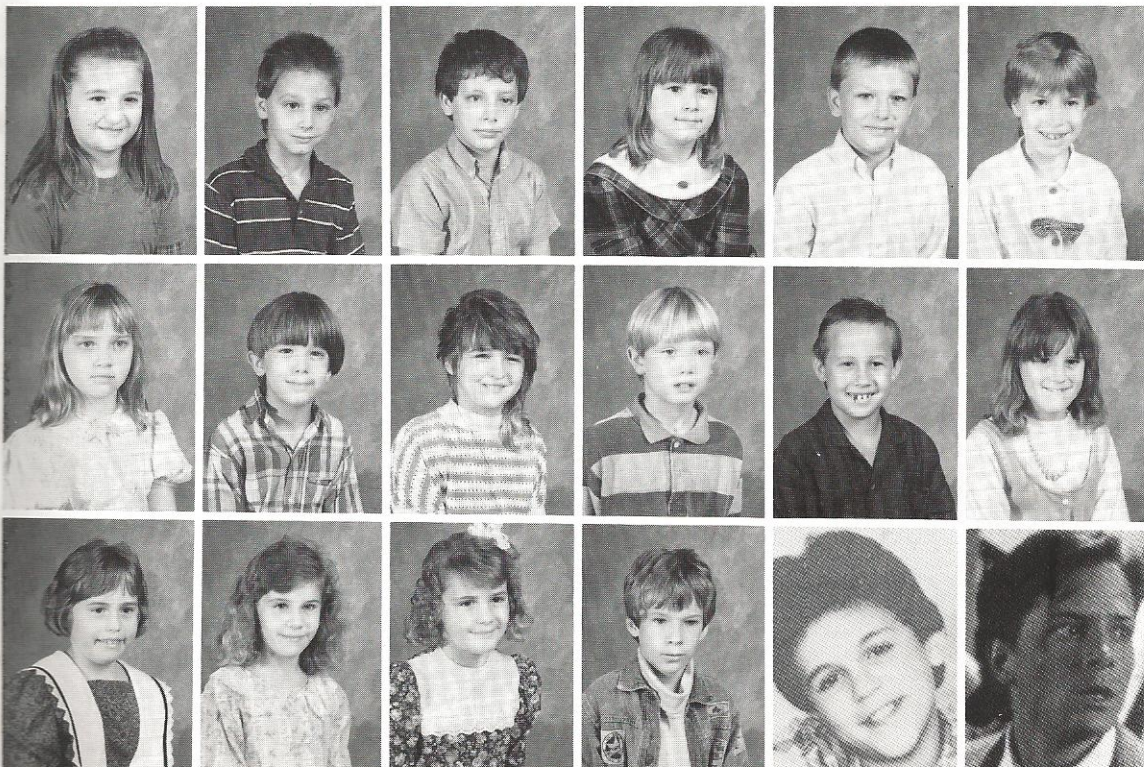


Full Speed Ahead

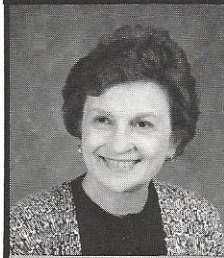
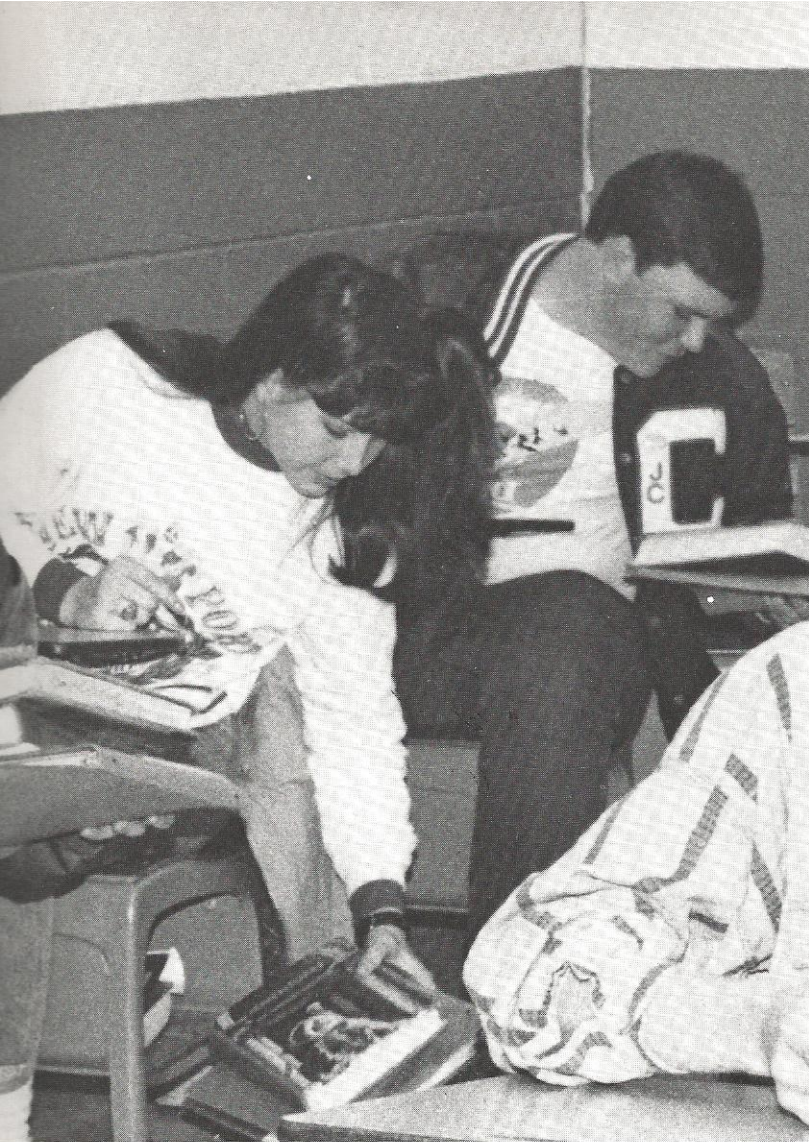
The Two Words That Students Hate To Hear

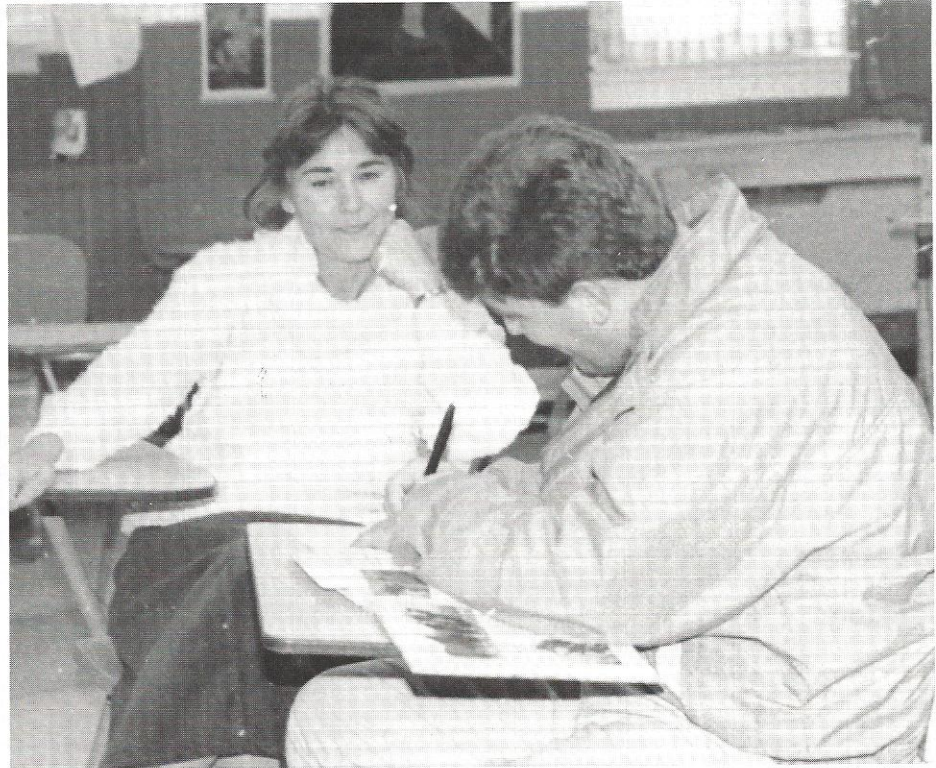

Whether it is a friendly smile or help with studies, Mrs. Speaks is always there for her students.

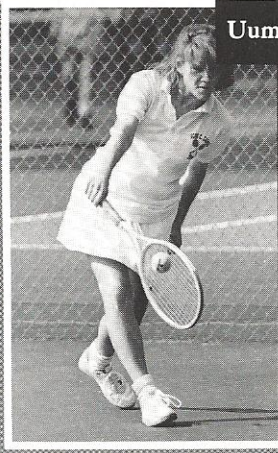

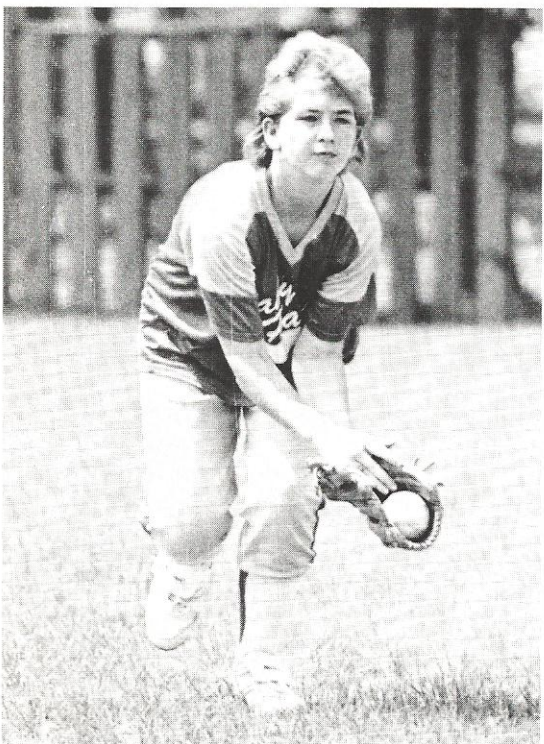

to seven victories.

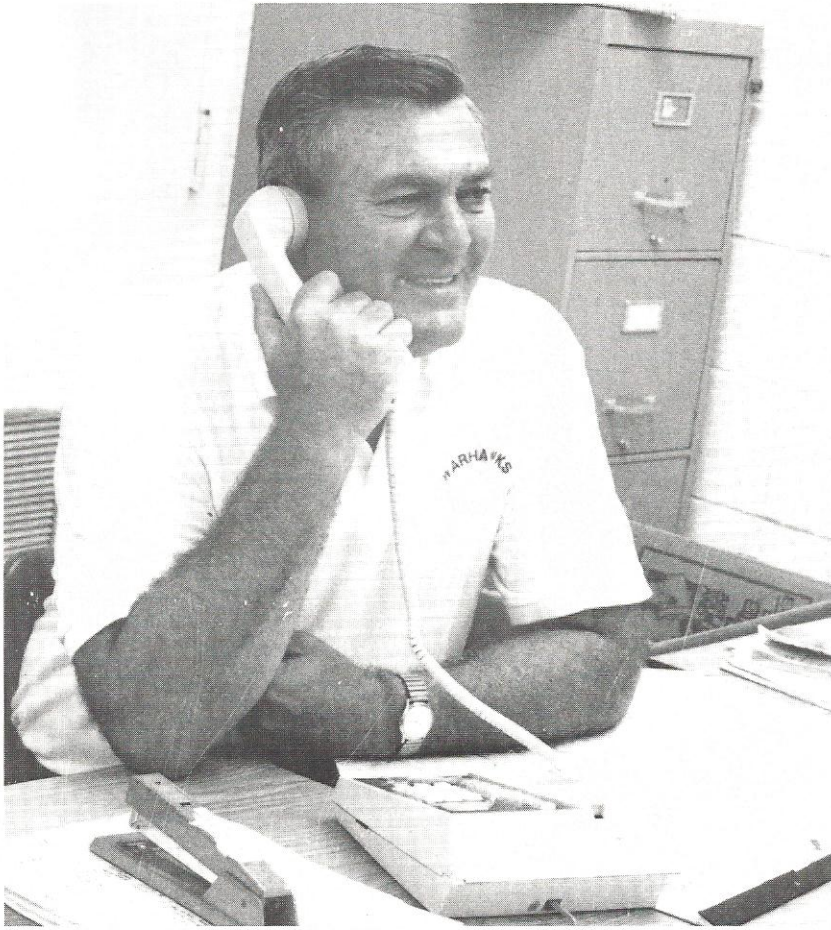

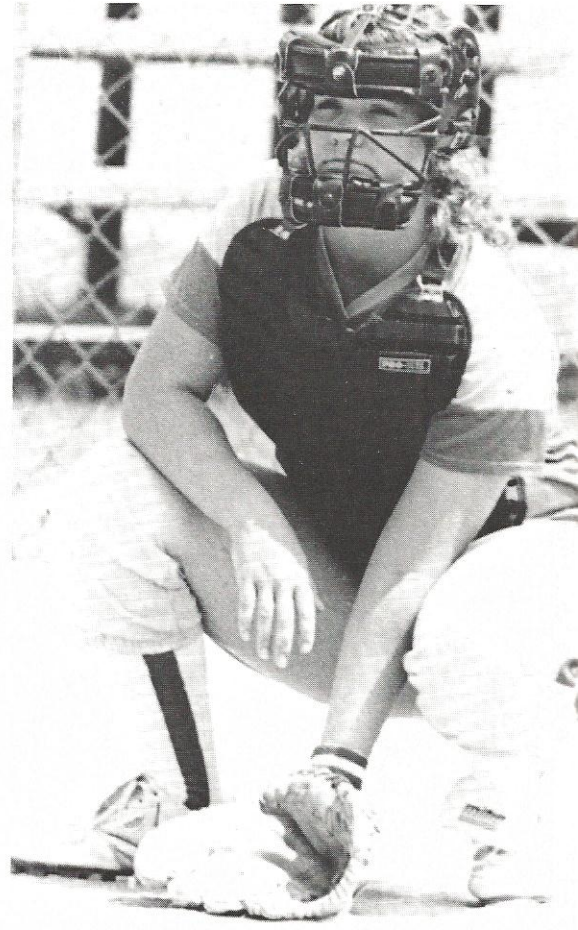

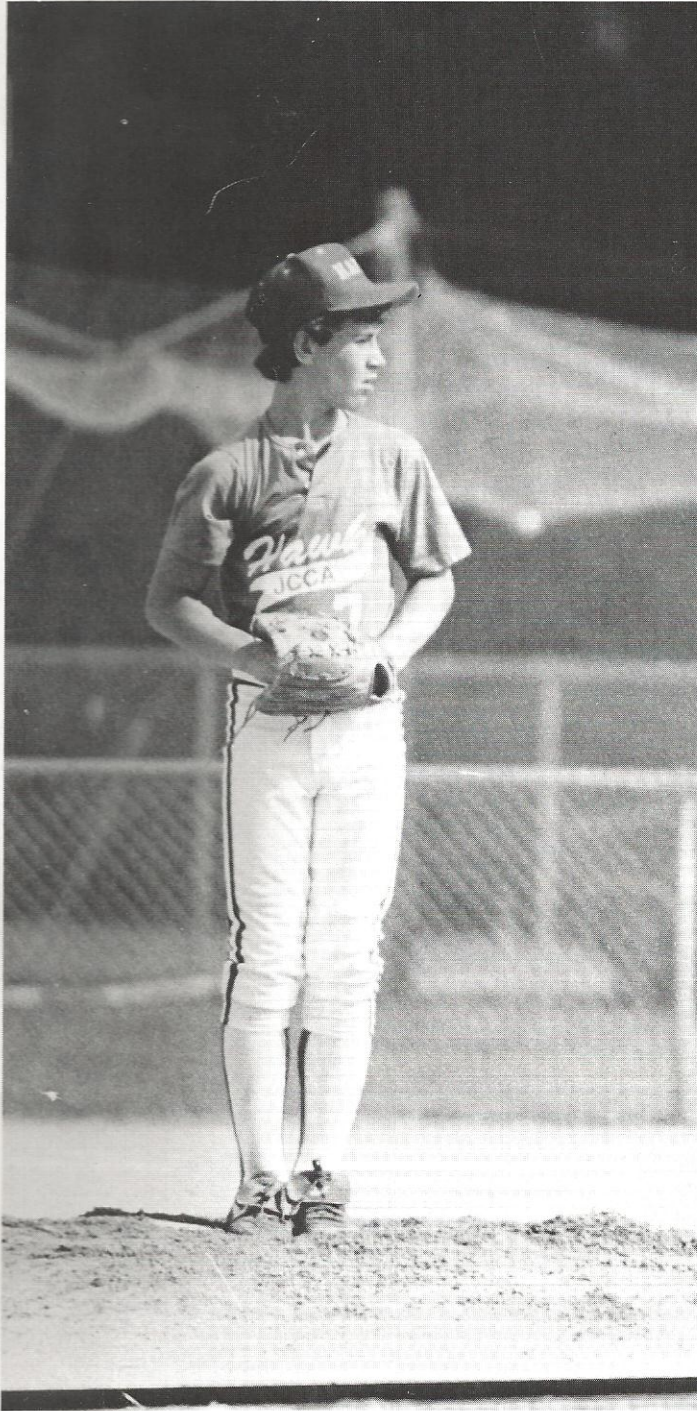

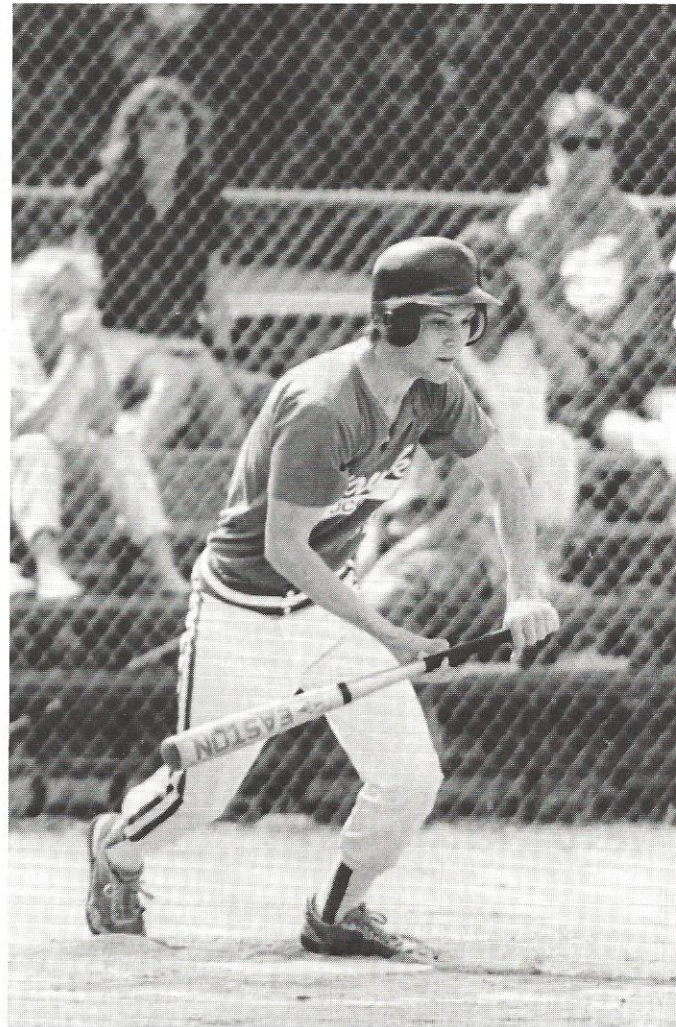

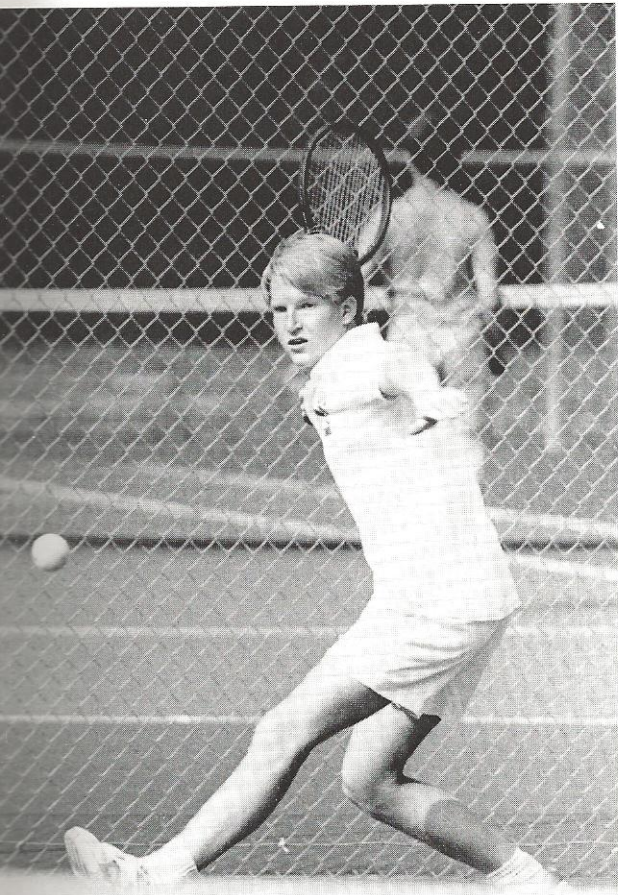

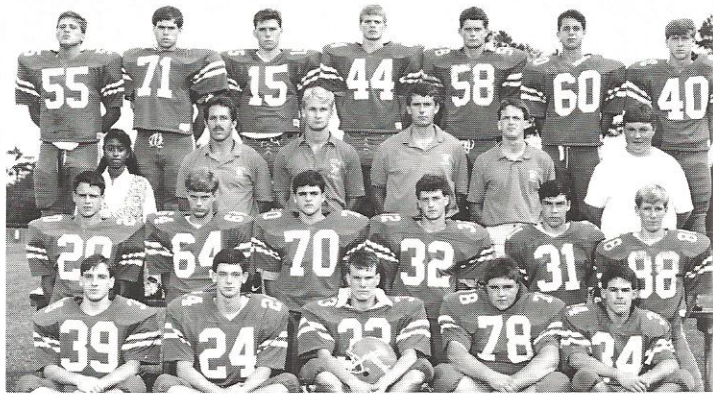
Winning *Isn't Everything*

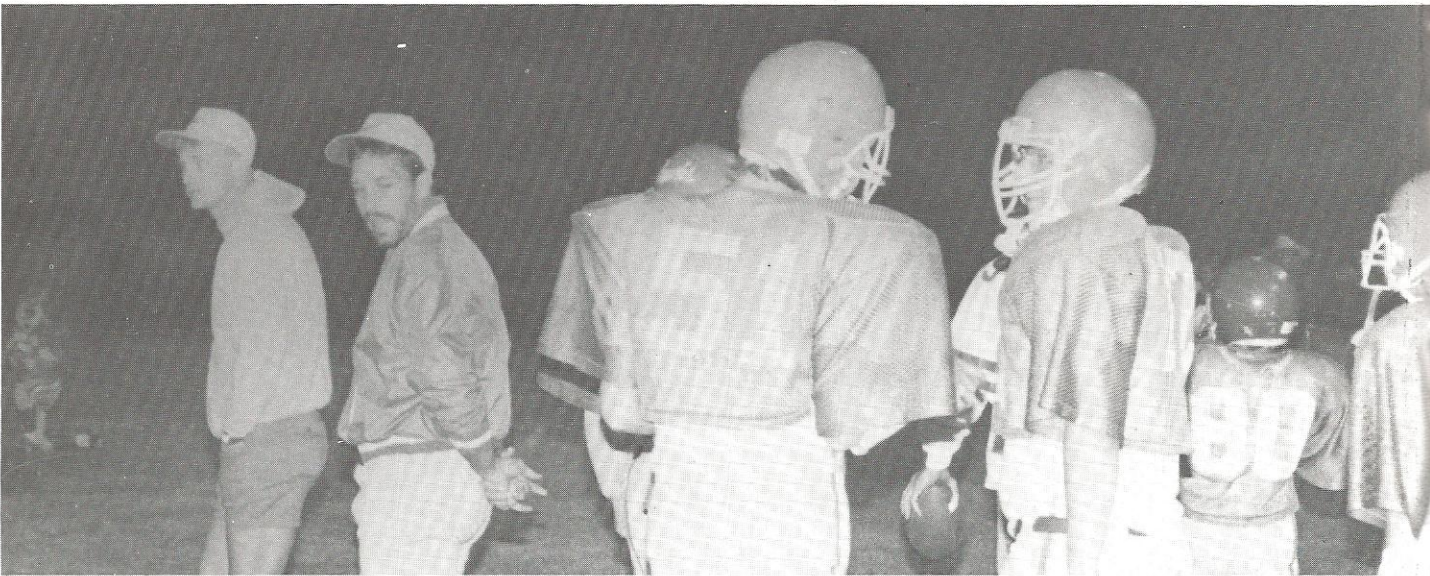

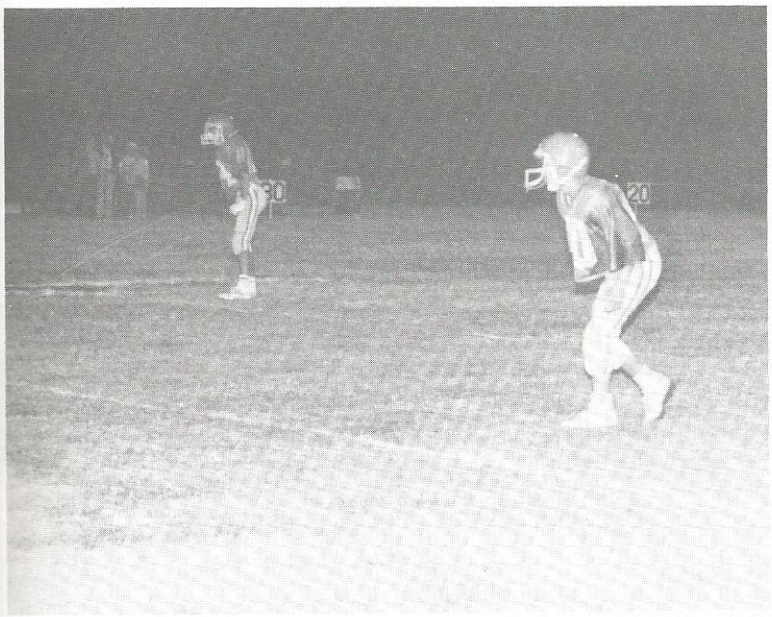

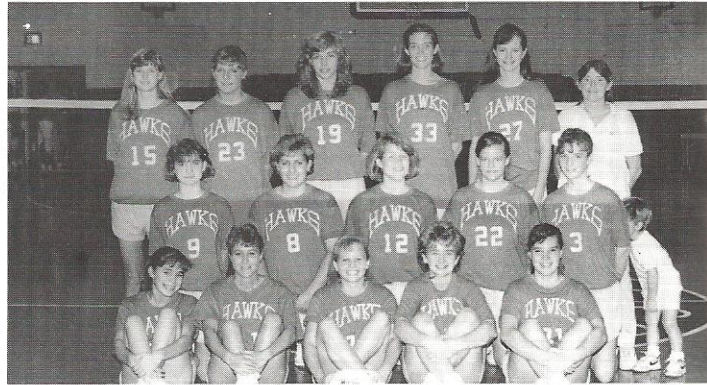

Throughout the year, a foundation was established along with a sense of continuity. Strong performance from seniors Cam

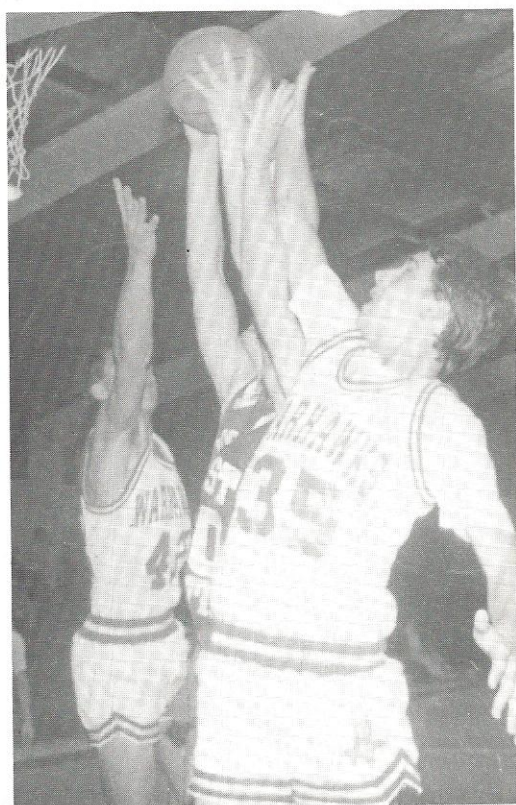

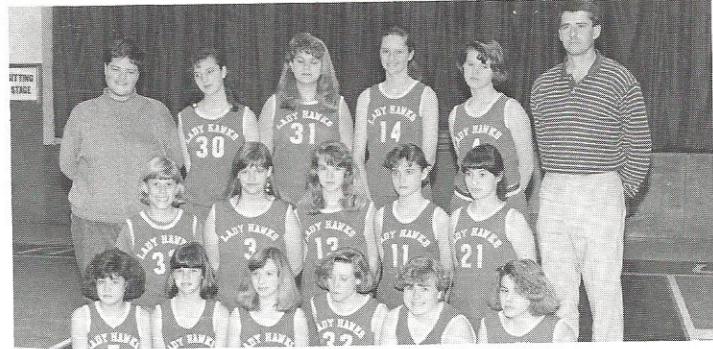
Is More Than Winning

There were several suc-

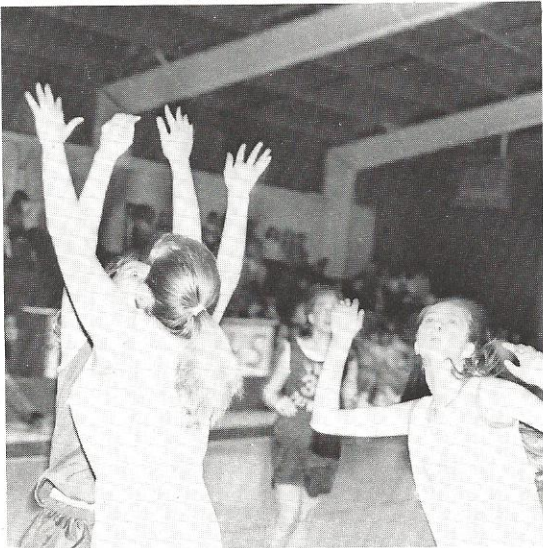

Jostens Yearbook Co. of Clarksville, Tenn., printed 235 copies of the 1990 *Talon*. Jack Young, our Jostens representative, and Jim Burchette, our in-plant consultant, aided in the publication process of the 152-page book.

Most of the copy was in 10 pt. Garamond and the captions were all 8 pt. The staff used a variety of headline styles in order to emphasize sections and add flavor to the subjects.

The cover was sewn-bound. Trim size was $7\frac{3}{4} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ with custom designed cover. Cover was light blue #290 light blue 538 with gold foil 380 applied to the title and navy 360. End sheets were light blue #290. Pages were printed on 100 lbs. gloss paper.

The 1990 edition of the *Talon* was handed out in the spring of 1990.
