The **Los Angeles Lakers** became BACK-TO-BACK NBA Champions as they defeated the Boston Celtics 83-79 in Game 7 of the 2010 NBA Finals at STAPLES Center. It's the Lakers' 16th NBA Championship, Phil Jackson's 11th championship as a coach and Kobe Bryant's 5th championship ring.




**LeBron James** put the NBA on notice in July, joining Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh in Miami. Ending weeks of will-he-or-won't-he speculation, the two-time MVP said that he's decided to join the Heat and leave the Cavaliers after an unsuccessful seven-year quest for the ring he covets.



It's been a long time coming — 53 years, to be exact. The **San Francisco Giants** won the World Series — their first since the team moved to San Francisco in 1958 — with a 3-1 win over the Texas Rangers in Game 5 at Rangers Ballpark in Arlington, Texas.



Since losing to Stanford in the Final Four in 2008, the **UCOnn Lady Huskies** didn't lose a game until December 2010. This loss was also against Stanford. They went 39-0 during the 2008-09 season, winning their 6th national championship, and followed it up in 2009-2010 with another 39-0 season and their 7th national title. Their winning streak went to 90 games, lasting until a 71-59 loss to Stanford on December 30, 2010. Therefore, the UConn Huskies had the longest winning streak in college basketball (men's or women's) history.



The **New Orleans Saints** have won Super Bowl XLIV. They beat the Indianapolis Colts 31-17 at Sun Life Stadium in South Florida. Saints quarterback Drew Brees was 32-of-39 for 288 yards and two touchdowns. But it was the big 75-yard interception return for a touchdown by cornerback Tracy Porter that sealed the deal.



Belgium's Kim Clijsters won her second straight U.S. Open women's title after crushing seventh-seeded Russian Vera Zvonareva 6-2 6-1 in the most lopsided triumph in 34 years. The secondseeded Clijsters hit 17 winners while making just 15 unforced errors against a nervous Zvonareva to match the three games lost by American Chris Evert in her 6-3 6-0 demolition of Australian Evonne Goolagong in 1976.



**Duke** beat Butler 61-59 for the national championship, a win that wasn't secure until after the buzzer sounded - when Gordon Hayward's half-court, 3-point heave for the win barely missed to leave tiny Butler one cruel basket short of the Hollywood ending.
