As Rome for many centuries watched generations come and go, so the Latin Club of Southwest has watched the classes come and go.

The club began in 1937, the year that Southwest opened. It was then called the Classical Club. Only students who had finished their study of Caesar's Gallic War and were, as fives and sixes, studying the Orations of Cicero and Virgil's Aeneid were eligible for membership.

In 1939, the club was called *Senatus*; it was under the sponsorship of Miss Steffen, Miss Woody and Mr. Young, who was then in the Latin Department and is now principal of Southwest. Its

officers were Consul, Praetor, Scriptor, Aerarius, and Nuntius. An outstanding achievement of this year was the writing of and the adoption of a constitution, which, with its later revision, is still treasured among the archives of the club.

In 1940 the name was changed to The Forum. The membership was open to Latin 3 students or higher. The offices were the same, candidati for which were elected in accordance with the provisions of the constitution. A high light of this year was the play Nil Umquam Ruri Accidit presented by students of Latin of Hanley Junior High School.
