## *Graduation Night*

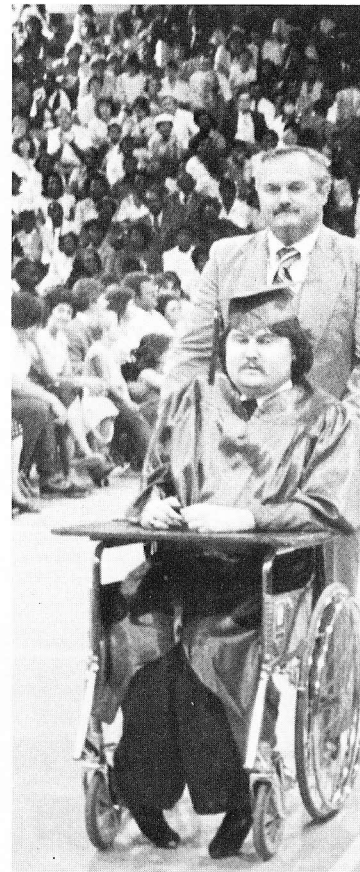
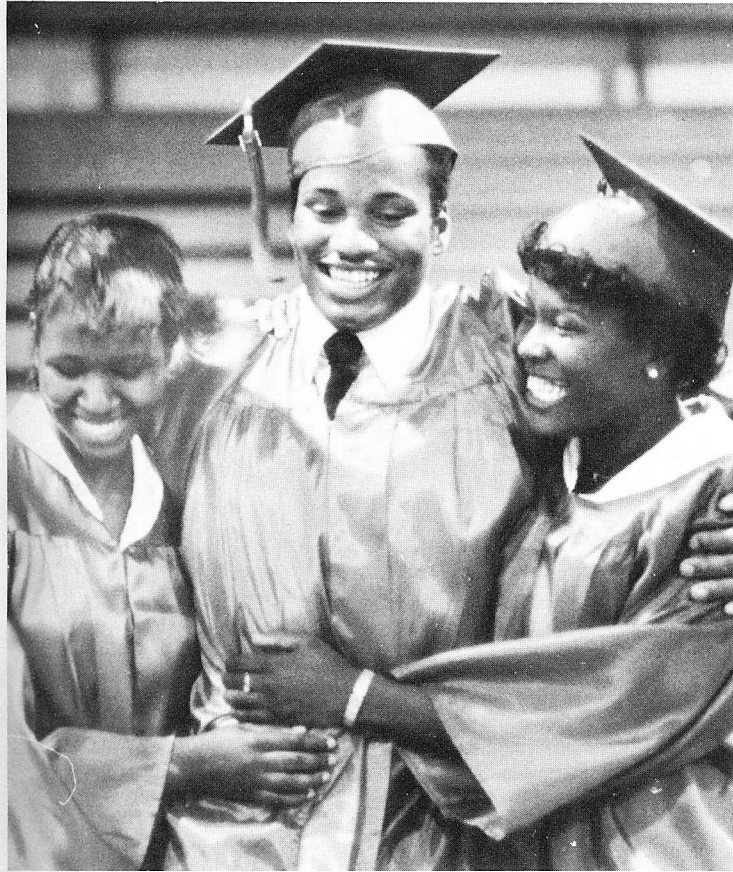
