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hroughout the year, students were given opportunities to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test, or the SAT. The test was required for admissions to almost every college and was requested for most scholarship applications. For the more prestigious awards, a minimal score of 1000 was needed. Thirteen seniors were able to make the score — a combination of math and verbal, with the hightest possible score being 1600.
