The home economics department included instruction in human sexuality, parenthood and homemaking skills. All these courses involved learning lifelong skills.

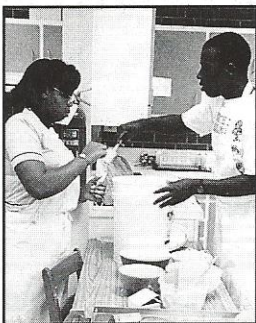
“Parenthood gave me the chance to acquire the knowledge that I am sure I will use later,” commented Sandy Sanders.

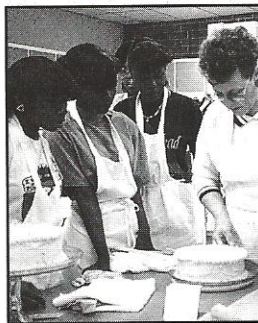
“The restriction placed on these classes was that males and females were taught separately,” Mrs. Carolyn Lewis said.
