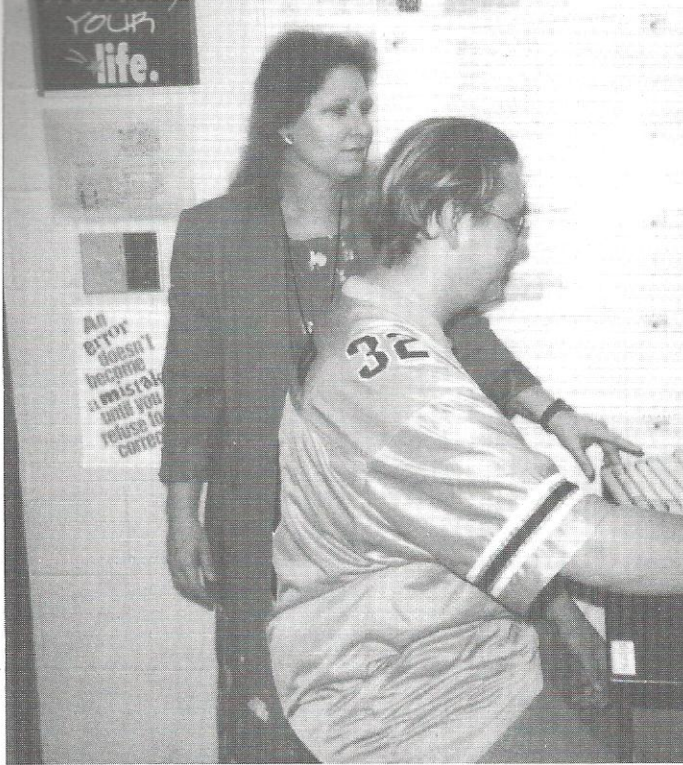


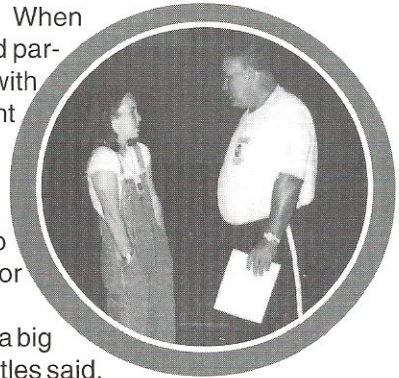

How much is too much?

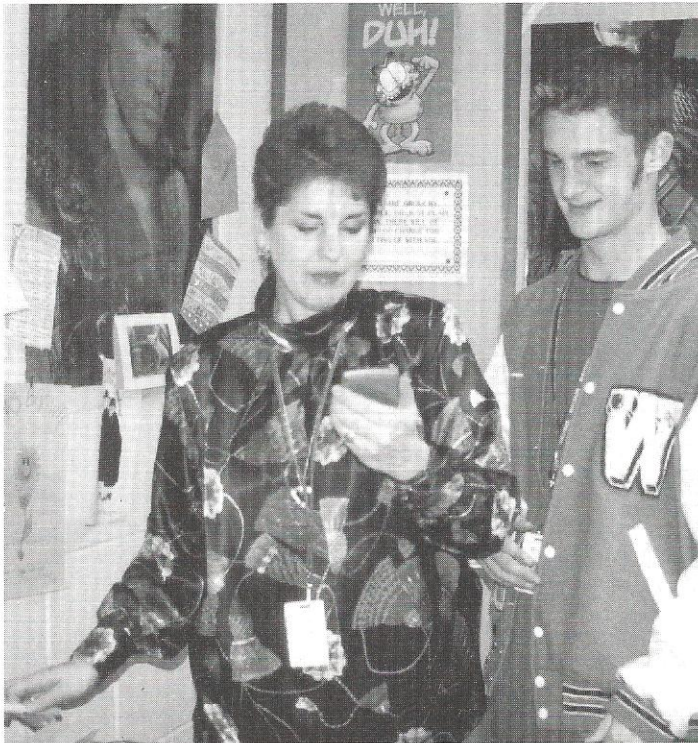
