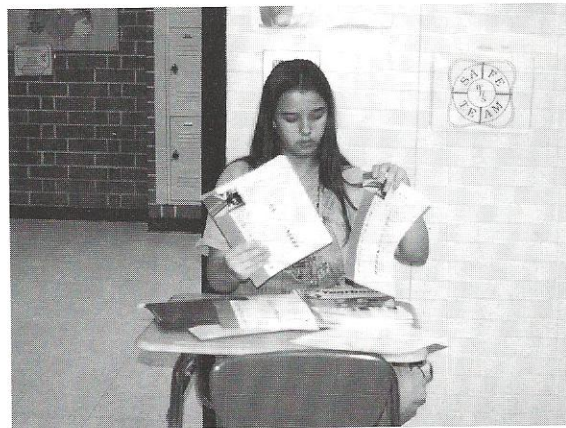
being in class all day at journalism camp, but in the end, everything I learned made it worth going," said junior Shantel Middleton.
