
FOREWORD

Leroy has made an enviable record on the campus, and owing to his business ability, he cannot help but make a success in the unknown future.





SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

Minimum management

As this edition of The Palmetto is the first publication of its kind to be compiled by a graduating class at Carlisle, we have wished it to be a monument to our work as Seniors, and have striven to make it worthy of our school and of its high ideals.

Since the advent of two of our class, G. L. Muckenfuss and L. M. Peebles, on Carlisle campus in January, 1918, the record of the Class of 1921 has been one of substantial progress and achievements. Though the vicissitudes of life have reduced our number, they have not broken our spirit, and we go forth to challenge the world, to advance to greater accomplishments, and to realize higher ideals.

Besides the two who came in the beginning of 1918, five others have joined the ranks. Our class was organized early this year by the election of the following officers: President, L. M. Peebles; Vice-President, Leroy Dantzler; Secretary and Treasurer, George Muckenfuss.

Peebles, our president, is first to be mentioned. Having entered the Freshman Class in 1918, he has advanced a class each year. Although occasionally he has fits of studying, they seldom last long. He commenced his series of honors in his second year, when he was elected Critic of the Kilgo Literary Society; later he was elected to various othr positions in the Society and rounded out his career by becoming its President. Douglas has been Vice-President of the Beach Society. In military affairs he has been Sergeant and Second Lieutenant.


How sad mid the joys that gladden these days, Comes the thought that now we must part. Though through years we must journey on life's many ways, We're forever united in heart.

To ourselves, to our Maker, be true.



JUNIOR CLASS HISTORY

Into every man's life comes an opportunity for success. The class of 1922, Carlisle School, stands upon the threshold of its Senior year, having already won many successes. From our past record we hope to be the greatest class ever graduated from Carlisle.

In September, 1917, eighteen of us arrived on the campus to begin our Freshman year. Although small in number, we were a bunch of willing workers, and were soon devoting almost our entire efforts to work. Our number was composed partly of girls, Carlisle then being a co-educational institution. That year we were well represented in athletics. The presence of the girls made the year pass very quickly; almost before we realized it, the session was ended and we were spending our vacation at home, eagerly anticipating our return to the campus for another year. Our proud hopes of being Sophomores, however, were rudely shattered when the news was gently broken to us that the standard had been raised, as a result of which we would remain Freshmen for another year. One can easily imagine our chagrin and disappointment, which gradually wore away as we settled down to our tasks. During that year the class was much larger than in the preceding, and, of course, we were well represented in athletics. The class also did good work in classroom.

The next year, 1919-1920, was one of our most important years. That year also marked the end of co-education at Carlisle, which became entirely a boys' school. Much of our glory came in that year, as we were the leading class in almost all things, being the largest in point of numbers and also furnishing nearly all the athletes, among whom were five Varsity football men and six regulars on the baseball team. These included our star pitcher, Claude McLeod, and the best shortstop who ever wore spikes on Carlisle campus, James Sanders, whose highest ambition was to excel in everything his brother, Dudley, who was a Senior. In addition to all the worthy athletes, our class possessed many other distinctions, among which might be mentioned the fact that we were awarded more deportment stars and scholarship badges than any other class in school. Of the three girls attending Carlisle our class had one, Miss Mary Frances Walker, a very brilliant and popular young lady of Bamberg.


Although our Sophomore year was one of importance, it fades into insignificance in comparison with 1920-1921, our Junior year. Upon arriving on the campus last September we found that our number had increased to more than sixty, the largest class ever enrolled at Carlisle. With such a large membership, it was necessary for the class to have an organization, officers being elected as follows: President, E. O. Shealy; Vice-President, Franklin W. Campbell; Secretary and Treasurer, Earl B.

Guess. All three of our class officers are popular on the campus and hold numerous other offices of importance. All presidents of the Beach Literary Society for this year have come from our class, as well as many other officers in all the societies. We have among our number the student who has been here longer than any other, Nathan J. Johnson. The President of the Y. M. C. A., Thaddeus A. Inabinet, comes from our class. The three company commanders and almost all the other officers are members of the Junior Class. The block letter football men from our class are Wylie Poag, Bennie Rhodes, Jake Smith, and Ralph A. Durham. James Sanders was awarded a crescent, while Joe Cantey received a monogram. Other good players were Collier, Lawton Dantzler, and Peter Stokes. Collier and Dantzler were also block letter basketball players. In addition to all these, many good players were developed in class football. Our class ranged second in the class football championship. In baseball we will be well represented, having on the team at least two veterans, James Sanders and Claude McLeod. We are almost certain to have other representatives on the team, which has not been chosen as this publication goes to press.

Due largely to the presence of "Little Fatty" Durham, our class tips the scales at 8,000 pounds, a large part of which is gray matter, as is attested by our record. The members of this class are determined to maintain the excellent record which the class has made thus far, and will exert their best efforts to see that it always remains in the forefront in all things worth while.



SOPHOMORE CLASS HISTORY

The Sophomore Class has entrusted the writing of its history to two members thereof, one from each section, in order that the achievements of the class may be set out in their entirety.

In September, 1919, a large crowd of homesick boys gathered in chapel for the opening exercises which launched their careers as students of Carlisle School. Most of the boys had never been away from home before for any length of time, and it required several weeks' sympathetic attention on the part of the faculty to make our classmen feel thoroughly at home. The majority, however, soon got into the swing of things and caught the spirit of school life. As Freshmen, our class had several members on the football team, while Large and "Hard Luck" Warren were among the brightest stars in baseball.

We began our Sophomore year with an enrollment practically as large as that of the preceding year. The class was divided into two sections and officers for each section were elected as follows: Section A: President, Otto Large; Vice-President, Ulysses Jeffords; Secretary and Treasurer, Faber Folk. Section B: President, Gerard Warren; Vice-President, Proctor Gordon; Secretary and Treasurer, Drayton Sanders.

That our class has taken a prominent part in athletics this year is proven by the fact that eight members of the Varsity football team were Sophomores, viz., Large, "Hard Luck" Warren, George Bamberg, Drayton Sanders, "Little" Poag, Proctor Gordon, Bratton Williams, and A. D. Connor. All these men did their part in bring ing the season to a successful finish by winning over Richmond Academy on Thanksgiving Day.


In basket ball "Little" Poag and Silcox, A. H., have represented the class.







FRESHMAN CLASS HISTORY

The work of this class in scholarship has compared favorably with that of any other class, although occassionally we are not very strong in giving arithmetical definitions.


