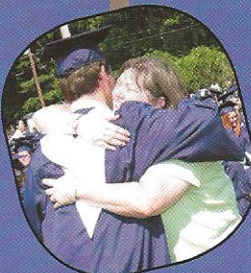
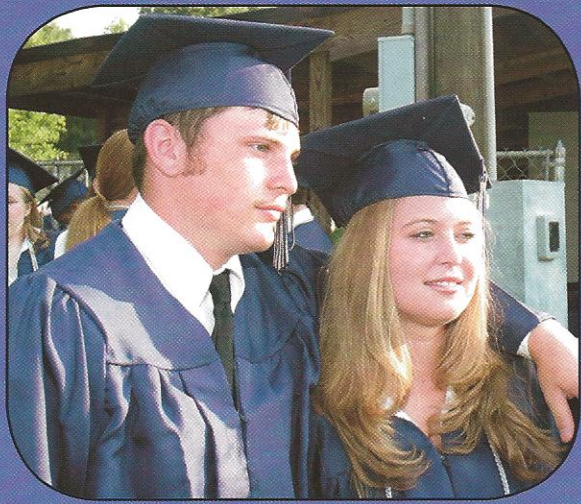


"Graduation was like a dream come true, finally finished," former senior Travis Daniels said.
