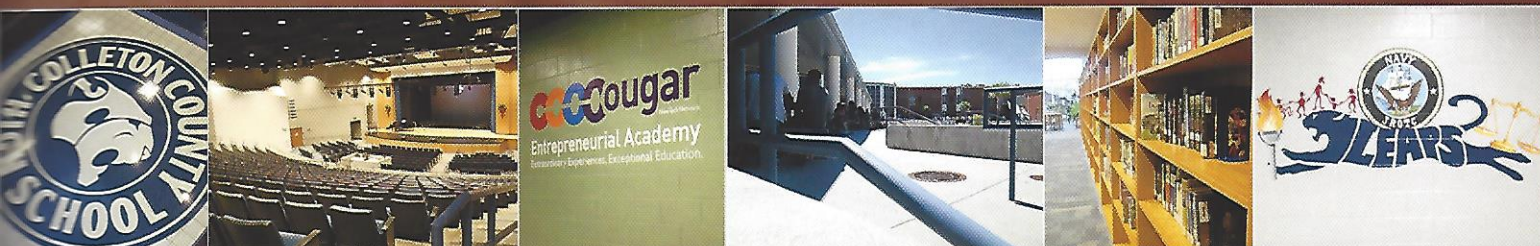

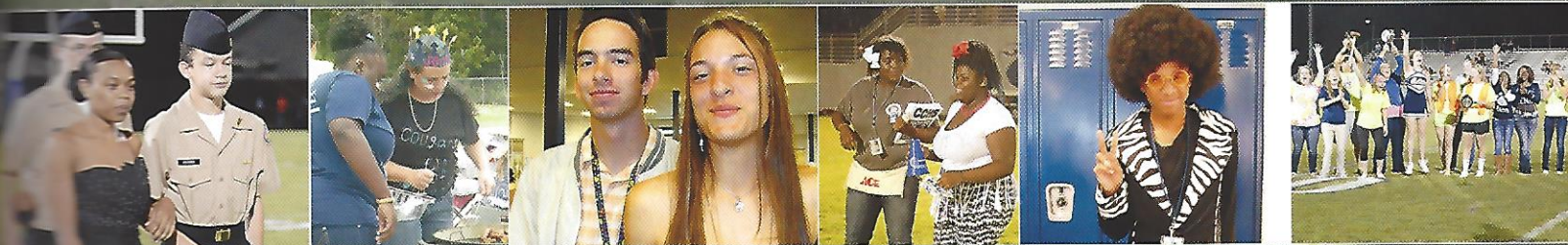

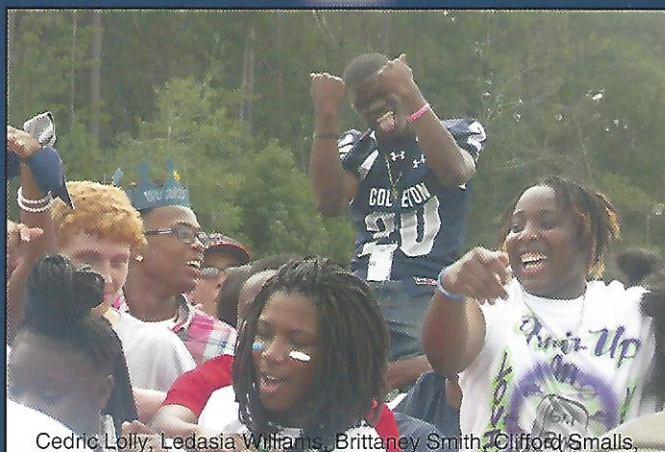

Senior Tailgate!

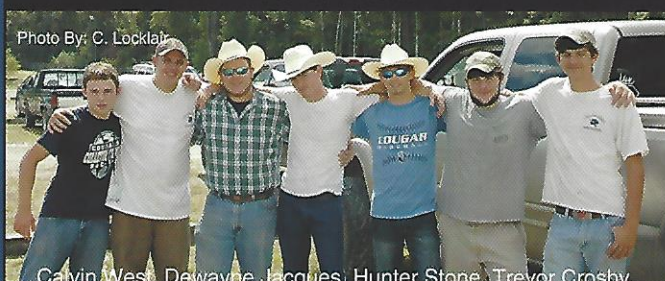

TCTC Spotlight

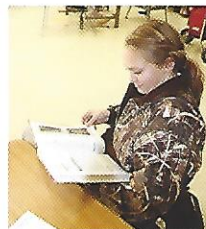

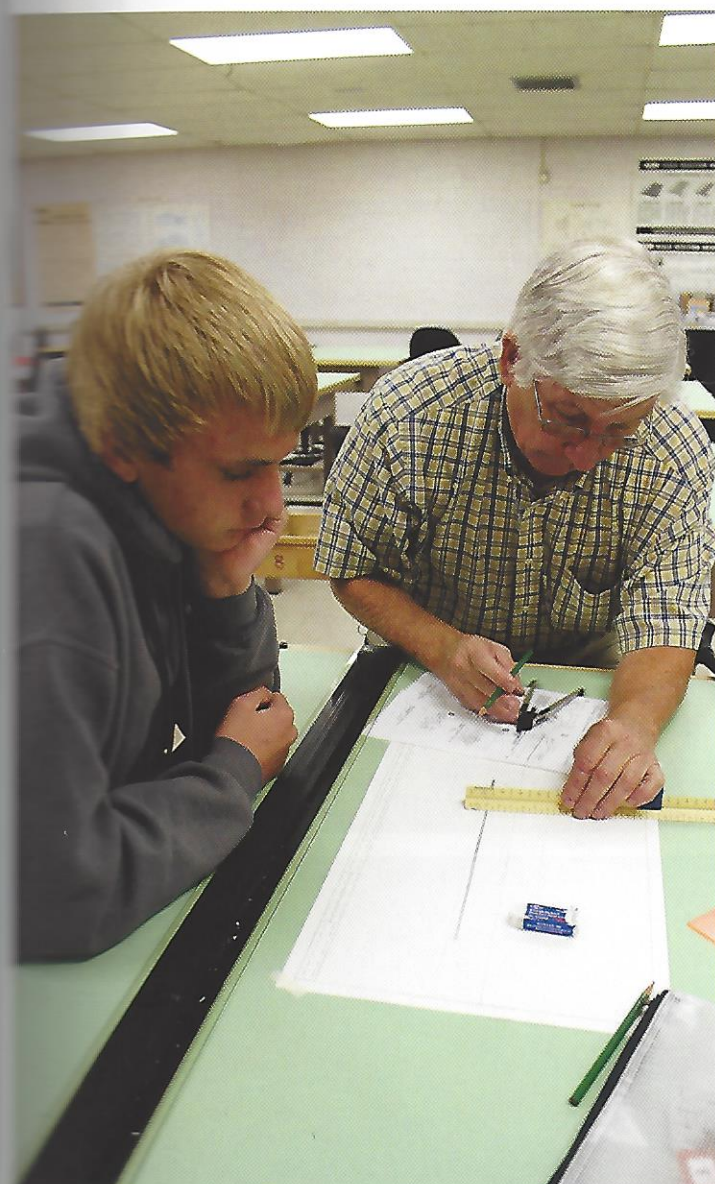

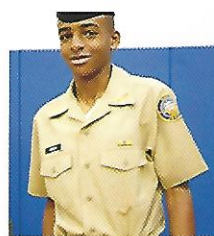
NJROTC

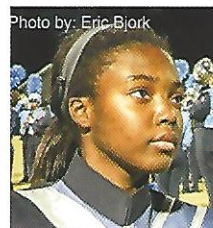

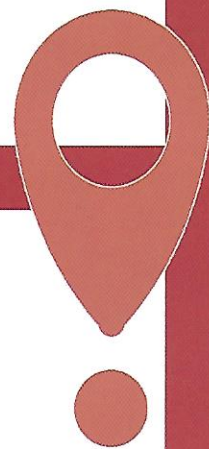


At the end of the flag feature, the girls formed an infinity symbol. They danced a couple graceful moves, to then slide into the floor to conclude their performance.

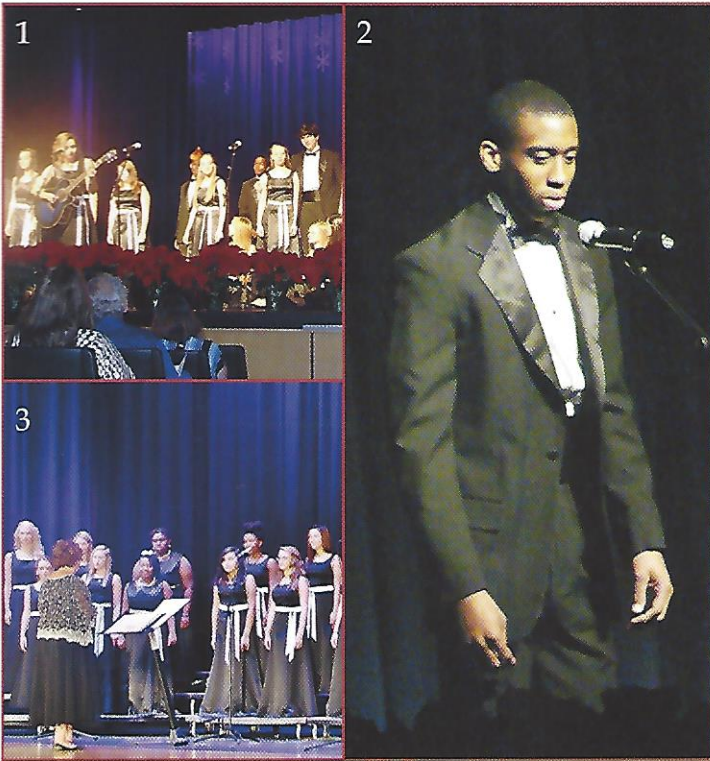


As part of the band, the colorguard took pride in marching across the football field. The colorguard practiced day after day to learn their drill moves and the work that went with it.

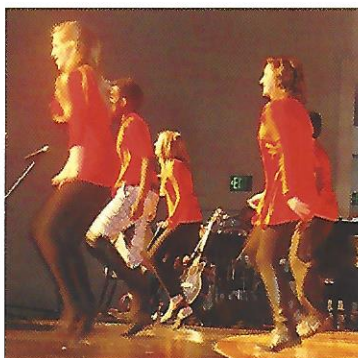

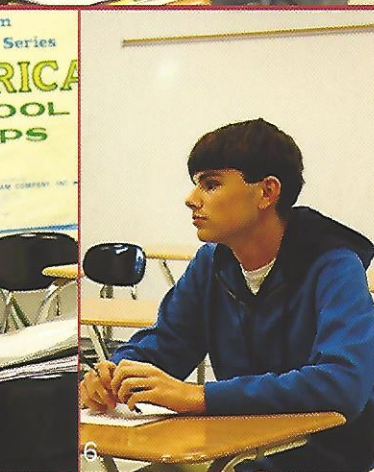
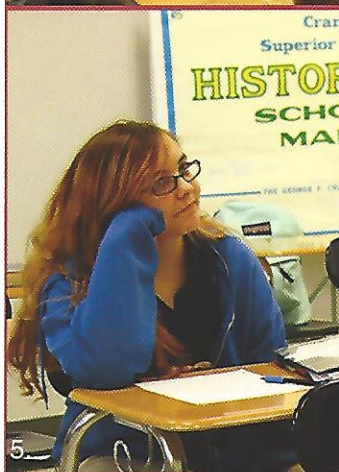
Academic Team

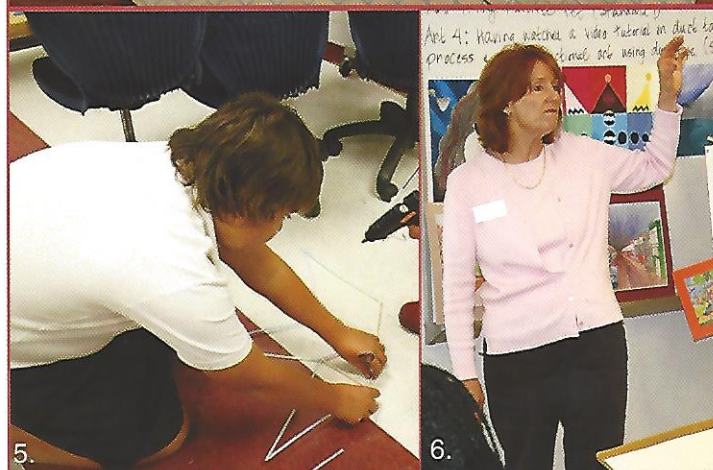
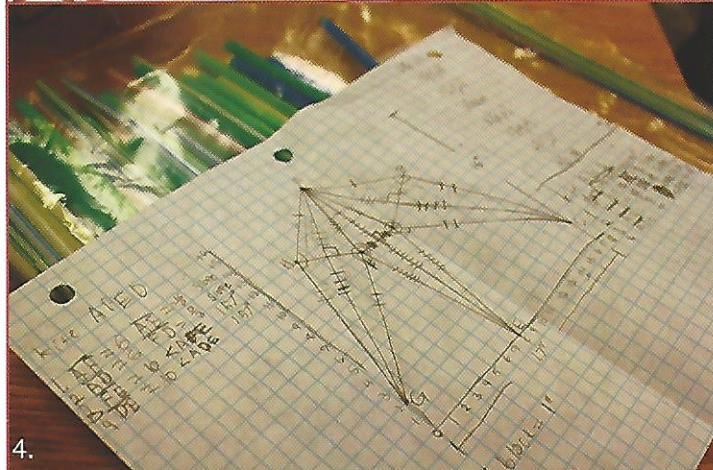
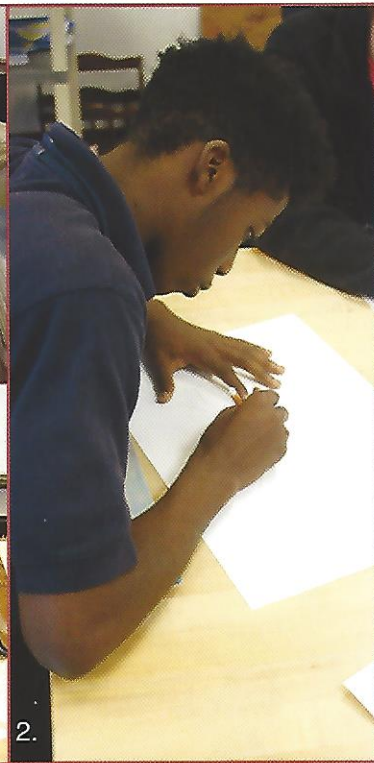
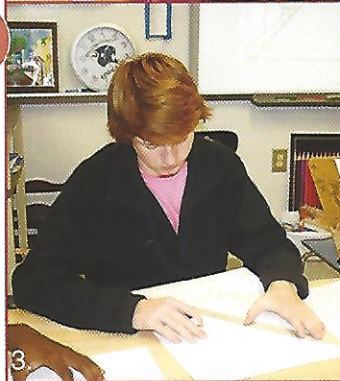
Art

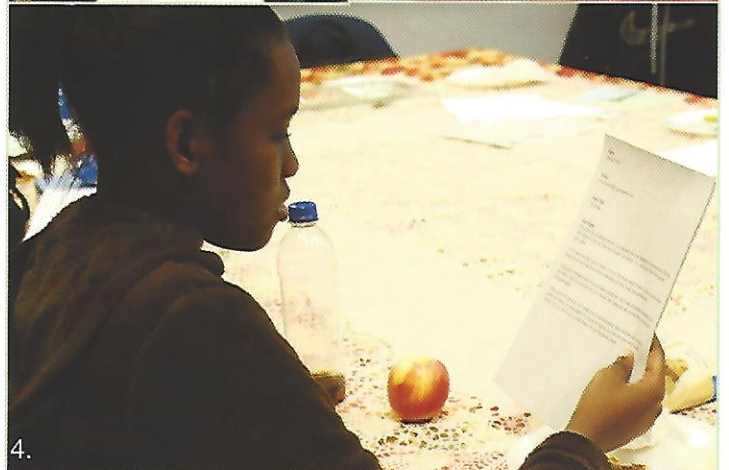
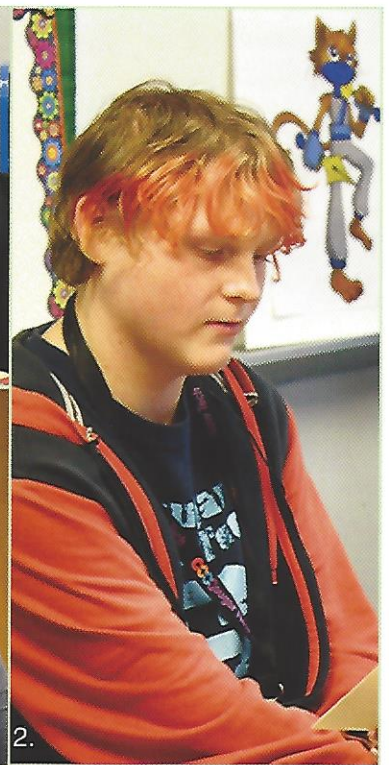
Poetry & Pizza

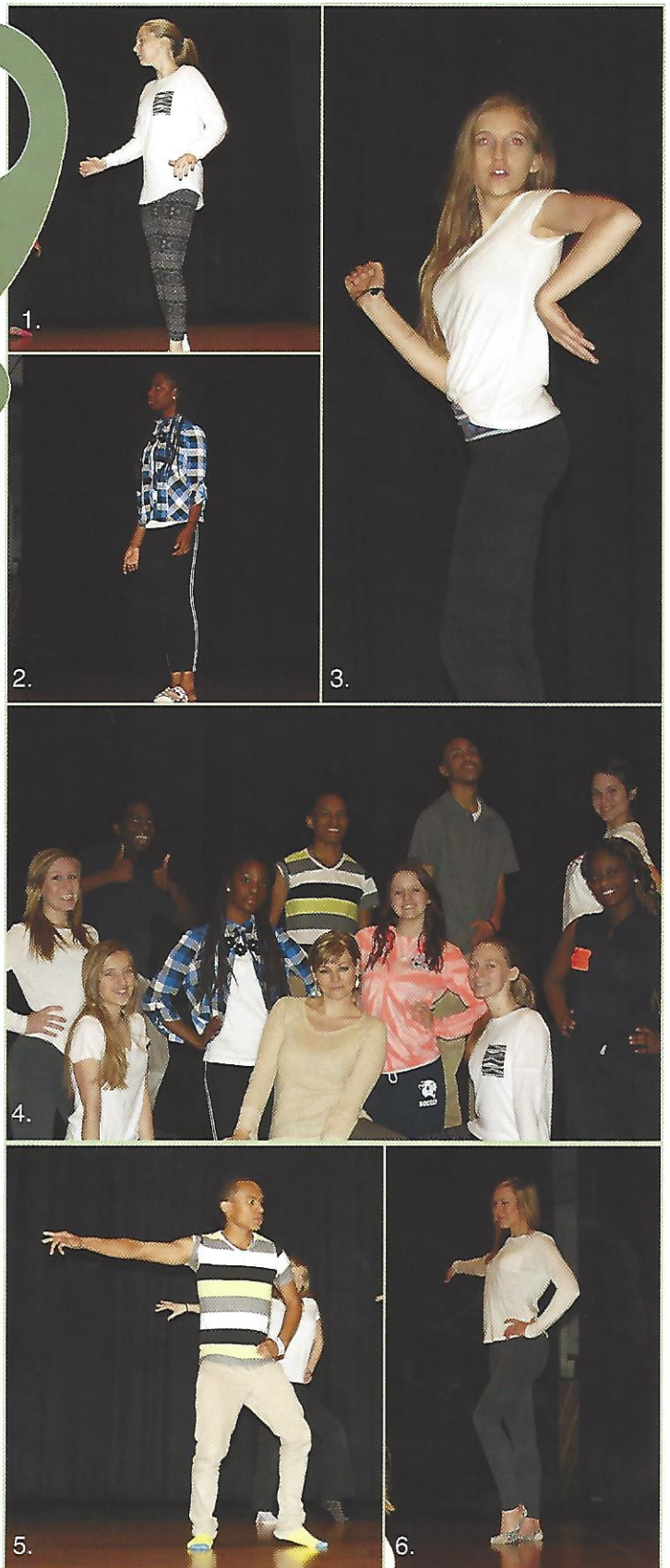
Dance Team

After every match, win, lose or draw, all athletes and coaches run up the net to congratulate the opponent. This act is a true example of good sportsmanship!

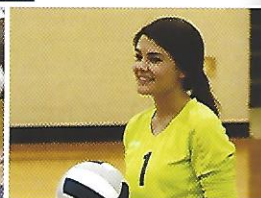
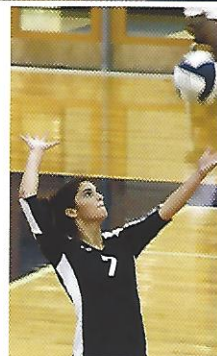

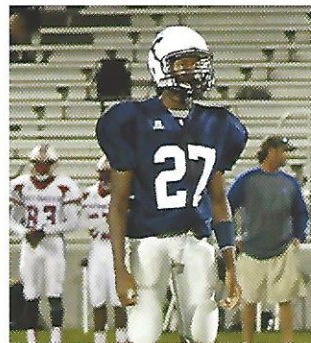

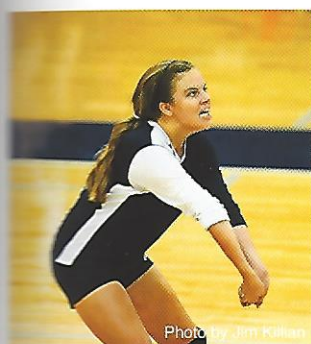
JV Volleyball

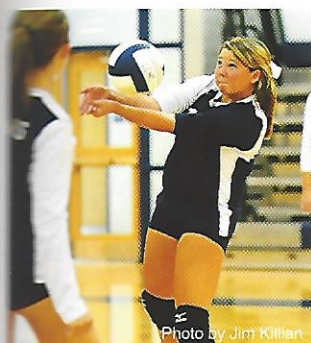

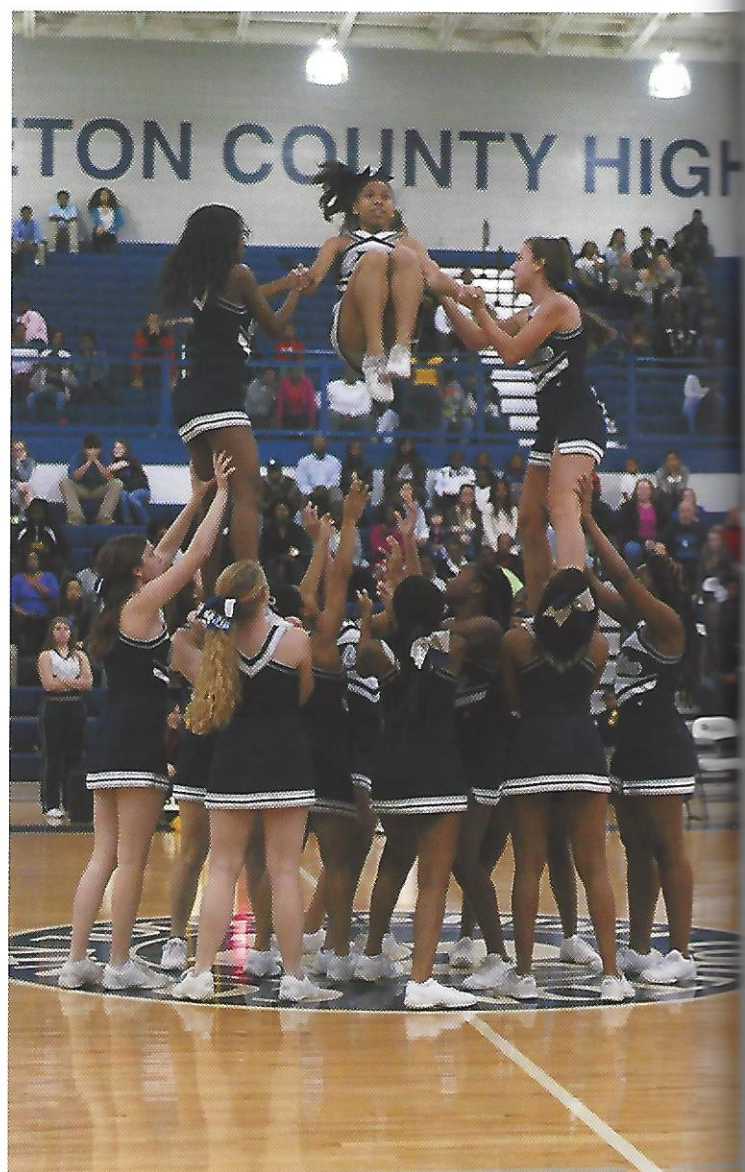

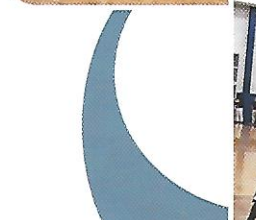

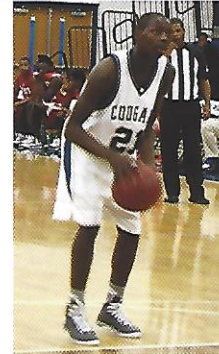

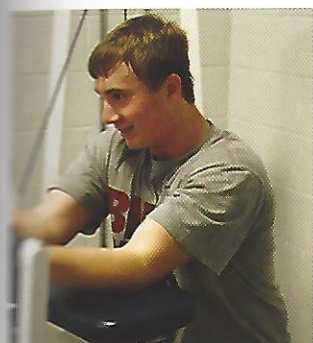

Wrestling

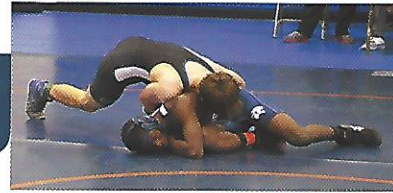

Coach Packy Burke has been coaching with CCHS since 2007 became head coach in 2012. He has been involved with wrestling since the age of 5.

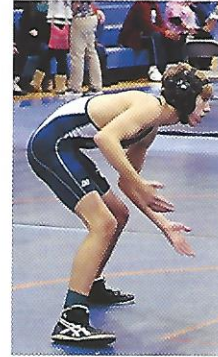

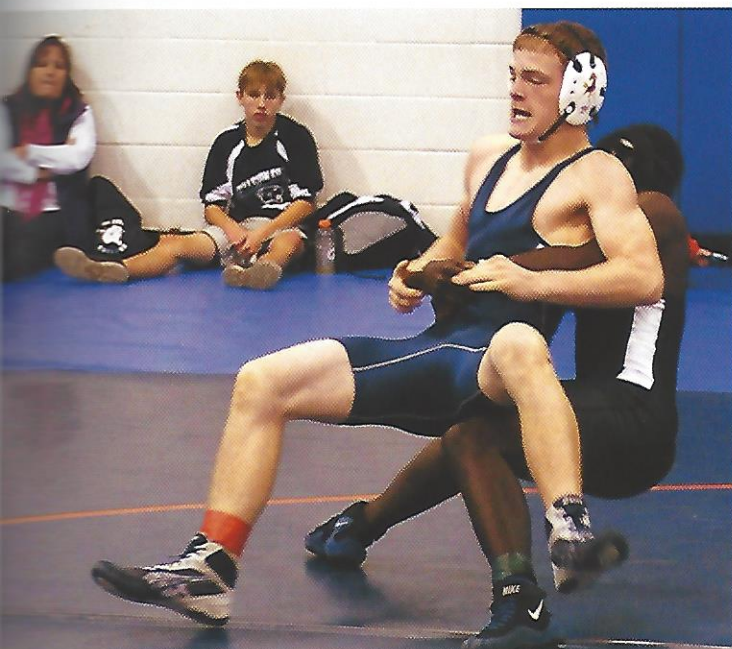

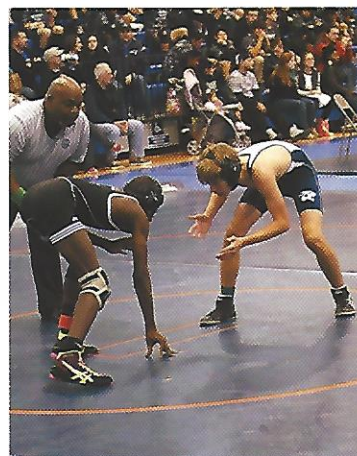

For some athletes, college sports are not ideal. For junior Cody Coursen, he would like to play ball in college but doesn't have the time and has decided to participate in intermural soccer.

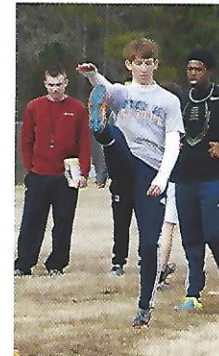

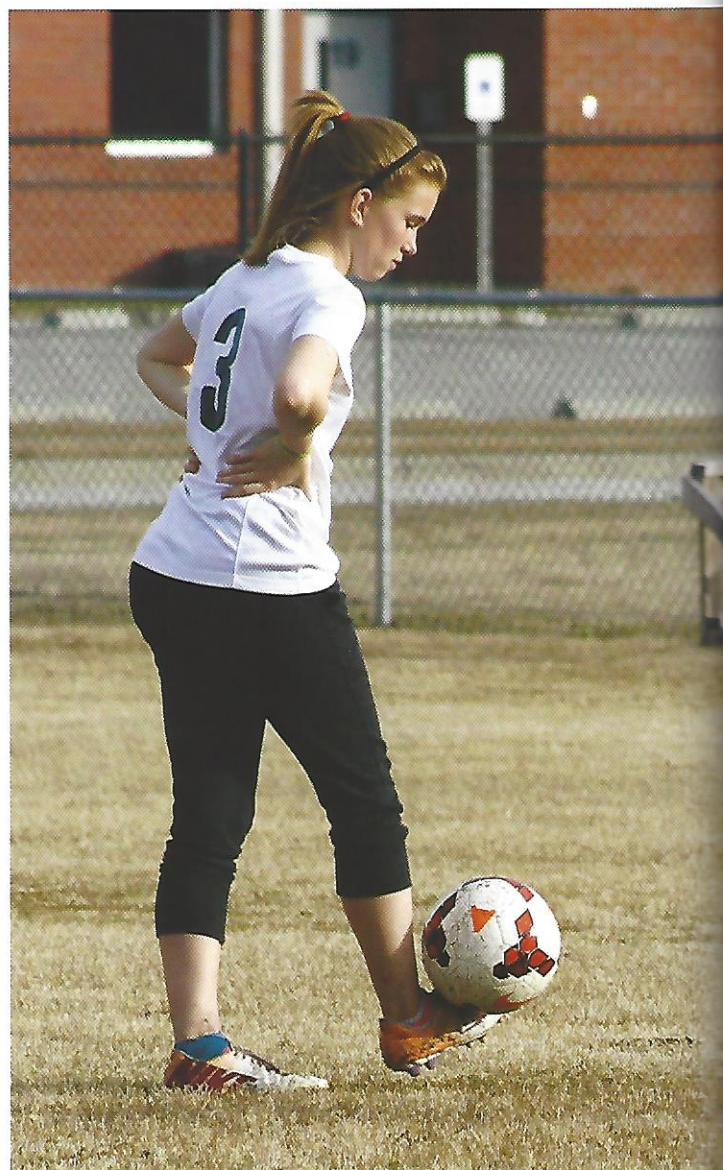

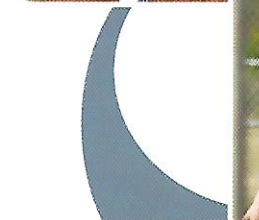

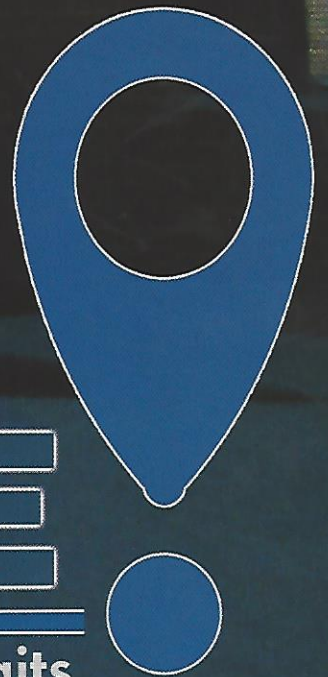
