



TEACHER CADET



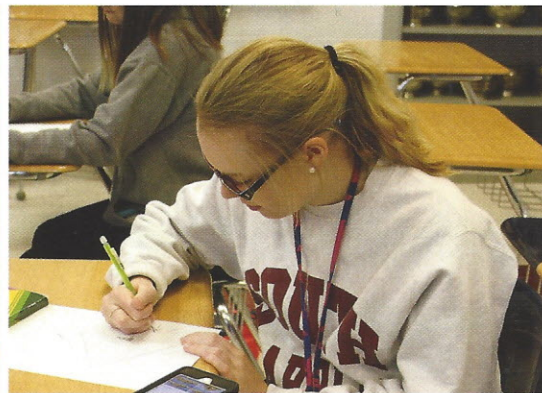

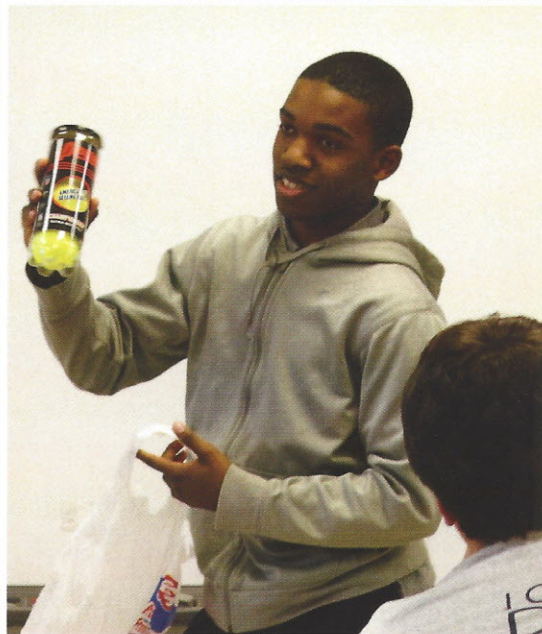


Junior Elizabeth McLaughlin says her ultimate goal in Teacher Cadet is to "convince [people] in high school to consider pursuing a career in education."
