


GRAND OPENIUGA GRAND

Groups of friends could be seen eating lunch in the canteen




Out Of Time







Has Hung Together Through Thick And Thin

These students had to work closely on many projects and activities, not to mention going to classes together. They hung together "through thick and thin" and will always remember their special times spent together.



Eat and learn! Tommy Carroll, Josh White, and Kevin Dantzler prove that food can inspire learning and lots of hard work.



They made it through the year and without a doubt that they could handle anything.








Patiently Waiting

The eighth graders patiently awaited what was to come next year. They knew that ahead lay a totally different world.




Searching For The Answers






The addition of a Journalism class


According to Mrs. Hawes, "Without the Journalism class this type of yearbook never would have been possible. Jack told me that our design is as complicated as a monthly magazine."




was sold for \$1.00 to the students by the business staff during homeroom. The two larger issues are mailed free to the alumni.



Staff members use computers for typesetting many sections of the War Hawk





The chess club was a new addition to school activities. The idea evolved when students began to play for fun last year. Gradually, more students expressed interest and the chess club was created.


The chess club participated in sev-

eral meets with schools from Charleston, Dorchester and Estill.




ECOND TO NONE!!


ENJOYING ESPAÑA



The crowd waited excitedly for the results. Michelle Jones received the crown and roses from Kim Strickland as Colleton Preparatory 1990 Homecoming Queen.




June 1, 1990 was for some the most important day of their lives. The day marked the beginning and the end of high school life and high school


work, the beginning of their futures. The graduates had time to reflect as they listened to guest speaker Les Tindal, Secretay of Agriculture.


There has been much discussion of changes in the Scholastic Aptitude Test to begin in 1994. The test will include some math problems that are not multiple choice and there will be more emphasis on critical reading skills in the language section. Students will be allowed to use calculators.

Mr. Quarles stated that he believes our students will do even better on the revised format than they do now. Our curriculum emphasizes the process of learning instead of the memorization of facts. SAT II, similar to achievement tests now offered with the SAT, will also be phased in in 1992. It will include a written essay section.

"Our emphasis on writing should put our students at a real advantage on this test. One of the greatest advantages of independent education is our ability to be flexible and respond to the changing needs of our students," stated Mr. Quarles.




Field Trips

Class variety lets students pick and choose according to interest and ability







Still, determination and desire to learn were elements which brought the baseball team through a tough but disappointing season.


The coach, George Brittle, played a major role in helping the players to develop

twenty points. The Hawks lost important conference victories to Thomas Heyward and Orangeburg Prep.







ability to hit home runs. Susan won a scholarship to play softball at Coastal Carolina, which is a first for our softball program and speaks highly of her abil-



Next 1990 season should prove just as successful with the graduation of only one team member, Cam Werntz. A strong group will be returning to challenge the links.






Talented Team Excels Through Season





Not the Same Old Thing





again the War Hawks were victorious. This victory won their title as the 1990-1991 Conference Champions. They also ranked number one in regular play.



















THREE pointer? Holly Griffith shoots from the outside and puts yet another in the basket. Holly's skill to "hit" three pointers is most important when inside defense is tight.


So Close






Drew Brightwell tries to pass the ball before being called for traveling. Josh White and Chris Fowler assist him by being in position.








Block out!! Melissa Hinton, a junior at CPA, uses her elbow to knock her opponent out of the way so that she can get the rebound.

If you ever wanted to know the "technical stuff" about the yearbook, this colophon can tell you. Below are the statistics, facts and people who made the first Talon of Colleton Prep. GRAND.

Jostens Printing and Publishing Plant in Clarksville, TN. was responsible for processing and producing the 1991 Talon. The entire book was printed in 80 pound glossy paper. Throughout the book, Century Schoolbook (style 15) was used in 10 point for body copy and 8 point for captions. Headlines were done in a variety of styles to reflect the editor's individual development of their section.

The basic design for the cover emerged from several "brain storming sessions" between editors and Jack Young, Jostens Representative. The cover is a True Life, laminated, wrap around, Litho Cover, drawn by Jostens Art Department. All layouts were designed by each division editor and staff members. All original art was done by Lee McConnell.

The first deadline was due in the plant October 15, 1990, at which time the Senior Color Section was delivered. The final deadline, February 4, 1991, included this colophon. The trim size was 734×1012 and this issue of the Talon consisted of 164 pages. 260 copies were printed and sold at \$25.00 each. $25 \, \rm cm$ of each sold went to the Lower School Building fun. 
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Our Busy Brownies

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
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The weight room facilities were available to all Colleton Prep students. There are nautilus machines and free weights, bicycles and jump ropes, for a complete workout.

During the fall, the weight room had supervised hours from 2:30 to 3:30 on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday afternoons.



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
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Being In Style

Dori belongs to a modeling group called "the trendsetter board". This is an organization that selects contestants to model at Charlestowne Square Mall.



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
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An Honored Scout

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
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
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
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Camper of the Year

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
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
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Spelling Bee Champion

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

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
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A Chosen Leader


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The Gifted and Talented
