At last we were seniors and in sight of our destination-graduation. This was the most exciting of all the years. We received our class rings and the honors and privileges of being a senior. We think that our class has set a record-we begun with thirteen and ended with thirteen.

As we come to the end of our voyage we look back over these twelve years which are filled with memories we will always cherish, and are grateful to our teachers and parents who have made our voyage a successful one.
