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## What can be said about the 1990-91 School Year?

Before the academic year even began, the school was plagued with tragedy. Two of our students were involved in a horrible automobile accident which left one, Charles Sundeen, in a wheelchair for an undetermined period of time. The other, Gregory Padgett, was killed, taken from us far too soon, having only just begin to live. Our guidance counselor, Mrs. Owens, was also involved in a terrible automobile accident in which she sustained major injuries which caused her to be out the entire first semester. She was lucky; all of her physical injuries will heal; however, only time will tell if and when her emotional scars will. You see, one of her dear friends was killed in the accident. The school has been plagued with fighting this year as well. For some reason, unknown to those of us who don't understand the workings of a barbarian society, groups from different sections of the community as well as from surrounding counties have decided to use Ruffin as their battleground. The fear of bodily harm caused one student to feel he needed to bring a gun to school for his own protection. Unfortunately, this weapon served not as his protection but as his downfall. Because of this incident he was expelled. Two more students, because they chose to use violence rather than dialogue, were expelled. One of them, when asked to obey the rules of the bus, chose to physically fight with the driver rather than follow the rules. The other, instead of talking through a problem she had with another student, took a razor blade

and slashed the other young lady in the face.

It is hard to believe that in the 1990's a student, in anger, would call the school and warn that he had hidden a bomb somewhere in the school building. Since he called just before the lunch bell, he must have calculated the level of confusion that would occur when the students were asked to go to the football stadium rather than the cafeteria. He must have realized that it would take the police a good deal of time to get here, and once here, a good deal of time to carefully check through the school while the student body and the faculty waited, not so patiently, outside as their hunger and anger grew. What he hadn't counted on, however, was getting caught, and I'm certain he never stopped to consider the consequences his actions would bring. After his expulsion from the schools in our county, he is now faced with the reality that no other school in the state has to accept him as a student.

So as not to give you the impression that nothing positive is happening here at school, let's talk about some of the good things. This year the students are fortunate enough to have breakfast waiting for them when they arrive each morning. Many students have commented that, "It's not like Mother's grits, eggs, sausage and toast, but it is a nutritious and filling start to the day." In any case, they are grateful.

Our football team had a good season and made it to the playoffs. Some say this was due to the fact that, for the first time

in a long time, they has a cheerleading squad that was there in all kinds of weather (hot, cold, clear, cloudy, even torrential rains) cheering them on, giving them 100 percent.

The music department was very proud to have students this past summer winning awards in summer camps as far away as Virginia, also to have had three students enrolled in the S.C. Governor's School for the Arts (two of them for music, one for creative writing). We are equally proud of the two students who, this fall, qualified for the All-State Honors Chorus by receiving perfect scores in the auditions.

All we can say is that the school year so far has shown us some rocky roads in addition to a few silver linings. No matter what else happens this year (and surely something else will) the students here are definitely taking giant STEPS INTO.....

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# ON THE HOME FRONT

It has been said, over and over this year, that Ruffin High is not a safe school and that the students are prone to violence. The school itself, this year as compared to previous years, has been the site of an excessive amount of violence aimed at either persons or property. The fact of the matter is, however, that for the most part the unrest we have experienced has been caused by people who are not students at our school and had no business being on our campus. Because of events which occurred in another county in the spring of 1990 we are now forced to be extra careful about where we park our cars, who we allow on campus and what activities we plan for the evenings, especially after games.

We are not trying to give you the impression that we think our students are angels, because they are not. We have had to expel five students so far this year because of senseless violence or poor behavior. What we are trying to do is get people to see some of the positive things at Ruffin, not always the negative. We would like for people to know that at Ruffin High we have a greater percentage of students passing the exit exam than the percentage of students doing the same at Walterboro High.

## Discipline Problems At RHS Deplored

A former Board of Education member says that something needs to be done about discipline problems at Ruffin High School.

Ben Steward told the board last week that fights on campus must be stopped, along with preventing non-students from coming on campus.

Students are getting cut up on campus and there is fighting daily," says Steward. "Somebody has to be in charge."

Principal John Stephens said

in a subsequent interview that fights are not a daily occurrence and that discipline has improved overall. Stephens noted that Steward can make his accusations without having to supply any data. But Stephens acknowledges that there have been problems this year.

Most of it, he said, stems from a fight that took place in the Hampton area before school started. The fight has carried over at times at the school. Three students have been expelled in connection with the most serious incidents.

### School Board Report

"The center of the problem is at home," said Stephens. "We try to provide a climate of learning. I can't take the place of the parents. The students are in a home environment most of the day and have to learn and be taught discipline there. Parents are going to have assume greater responsibility."

Considering the number of teen mothers and fathers at Ruffin, said Stephens. "We're doing a good job. Learning is not their priority."

In other business at the Nov. 13 board meeting:

— The trustees agreed that a school bus could pick up the child of Nell Rivers in Lakeshore subdivision. The elementary school student had been walking on the road to a bus stop.

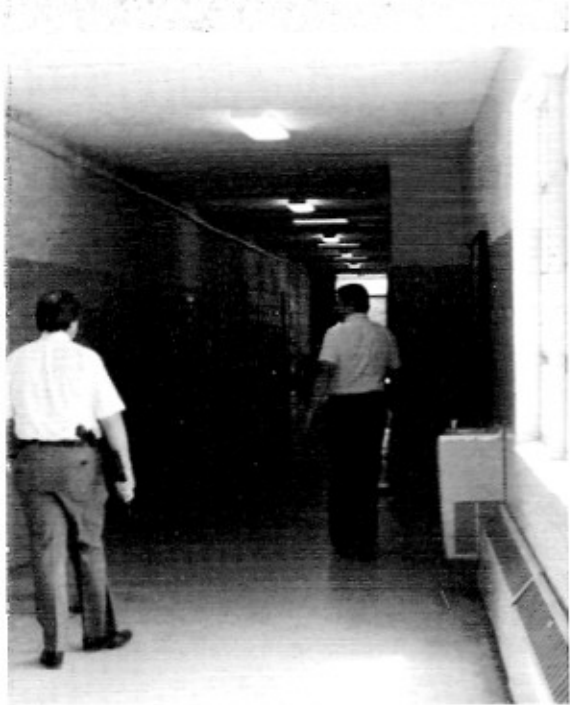

# Minors, Taking On Major Responsibilities.

In the game of life, we are dealt some rough hands at one time or another. One of the toughest jobs ever given is the caring for and nurturing of a child. This job should be saved for a time when there are two responsible adults who are established in their careers and prepared to take on this task both financially and emotionally. All too often, however, this job goes to two teenagers who haven't even made decisions about their own lives' paths.

I spoke with three sets of people about their facing the challenges this situation has put in their paths. They were asked about birth control, how they did or why they did not use it, if they considered abortion, what changes they made in their present lives to support this child, their greatest joys, their roughest times, their hopes for their child, and their advise to others who find themselves in the same situation. If you do find yourself in this situation, there is help.

Did we ever take any birth control precautions? It never occurred to us to use anything. Did we consider abortion? I did, but my girlfriend didn't. She felt that since the child didn't ask to be here, we shouldn't kill it. To support our

child, I work more hours at work, and I joined the national guard for insurance purposes. I also took steps to graduate early.

Our greatest joys? As a mother, it's a joy to have someone who's a special part of me. She'll always be special to me. As a father, I was overjoyed when, one Sunday afternoon, the baby said "Daddy" for the first time. I also love just spending time with her. The roughest times? As a mother, I would like my baby's father to spend more time with her. As a father it's hard working to support the child and still trying to please the mother and grandparents.

Hopes for the child? I hope she won't get pregnant while in school. I want her to have slightly different values and be more responsible than we were about sex. We have no regrets because we have a beautiful person who belongs to us.

Advise to others? Accidents do happen, so make sure you take the precautions to avoid them. But, whatever happens, don't get so down about it because it could always be worse. "And remember that all the extra work you have to do is worth the joy you get from being with your child."







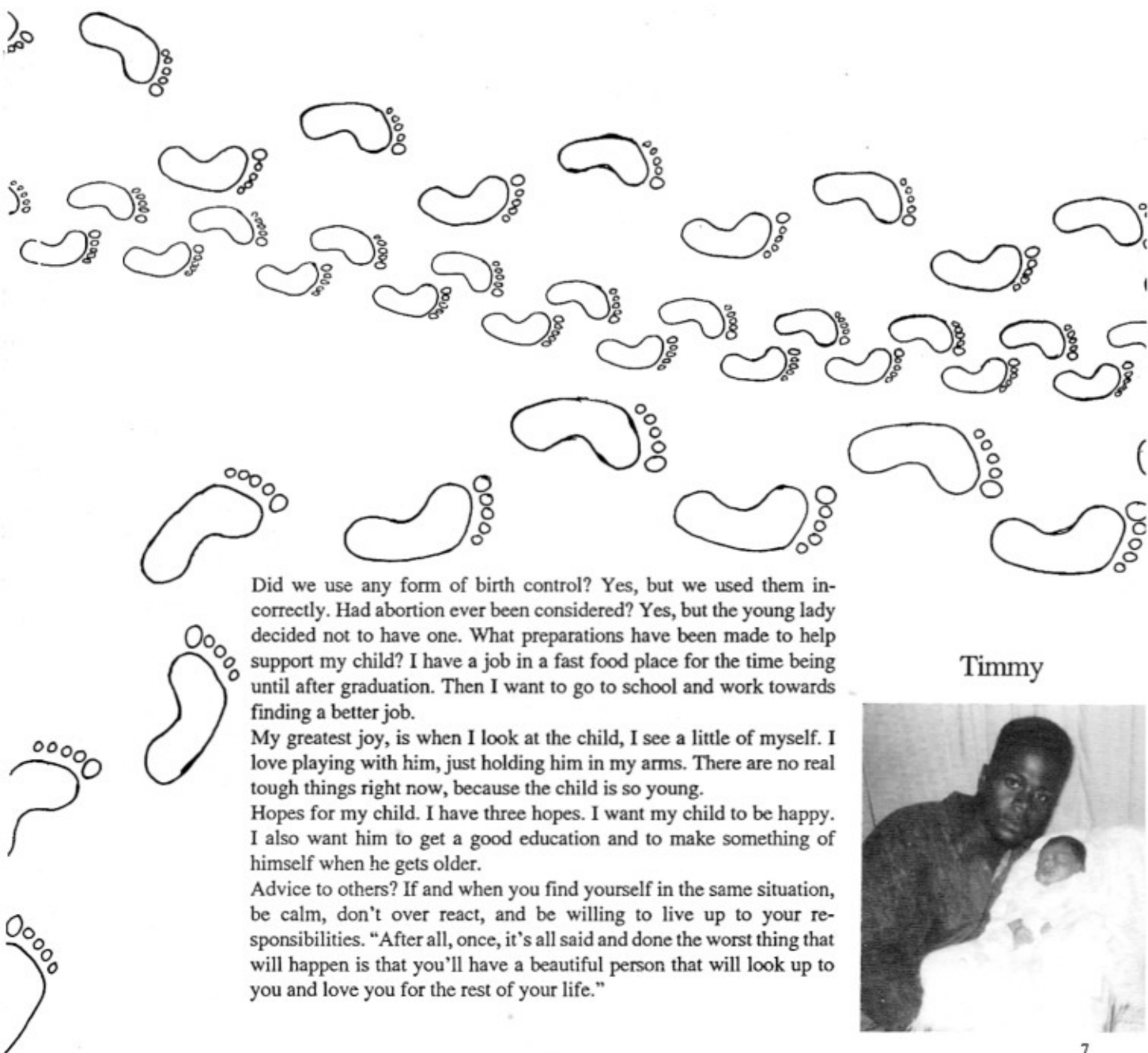

Did we take precautions? Yes, but they apparently failed. Did we consider abortion? Yes, it was the first thing that came to mind, but more out of fear than irresponsibility. Preparations taken to support the child? Since I'm going to be a father, I have increased my work load. The mother will graduate, get a job, and go to school.

The greatest joy? For (the father), it was a joy to hear the baby's heartbeat, see the ultrasound, and feeling the baby kick. I (the mother) am grateful Marcus didn't go through that "it's not mine phase" and abandon me. What has been the roughest thing? It was hard having to tell our parents and grandparents. It's also difficult dealing with doctors and having my mother get off work to run me to my appointments.

Wishes and hopes for our child? We want the baby to grow up and make something of himself (or herself). We hope the same thing that happened to us won't happen to him or her. We want him (or her) to have the best life possible.

Our advise to others? Always take extra precautions even if you think you know what you're doing. And, never say it can't happen to you, because it can.



Did we use any form of birth control? Yes, but we used them incorrectly. Had abortion ever been considered? Yes, but the young lady decided not to have one. What preparations have been made to help support my child? I have a job in a fast food place for the time being until after graduation. Then I want to go to school and work towards finding a better job.

My greatest joy, is when I look at the child, I see a little of myself. I love playing with him, just holding him in my arms. There are no real tough things right now, because the child is so young.

Hopes for my child. I have three hopes. I want my child to be happy. I also want him to get a good education and to make something of himself when he gets older.

Advice to others? If and when you find yourself in the same situation, be calm, don't over react, and be willing to live up to your responsibilities. "After all, once, it's all said and done the worst thing that will happen is that you'll have a beautiful person that will look up to you and love you for the rest of your life."

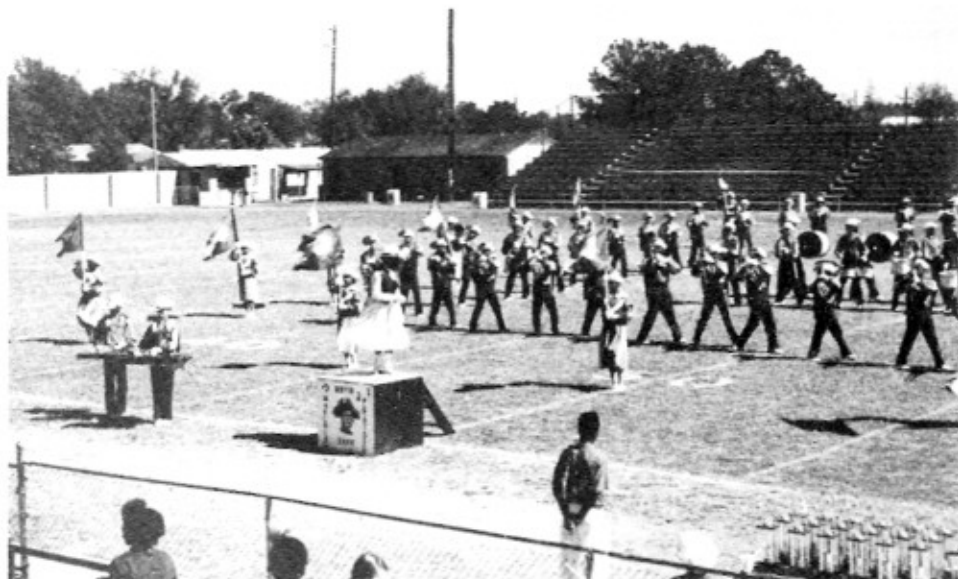

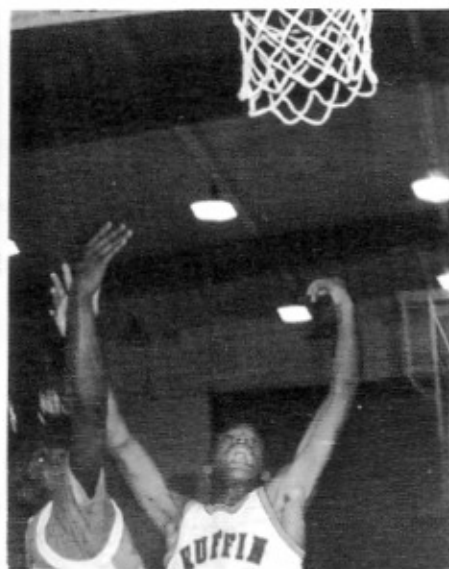
