The weather played a big part in summer activities. Rain put a stop to

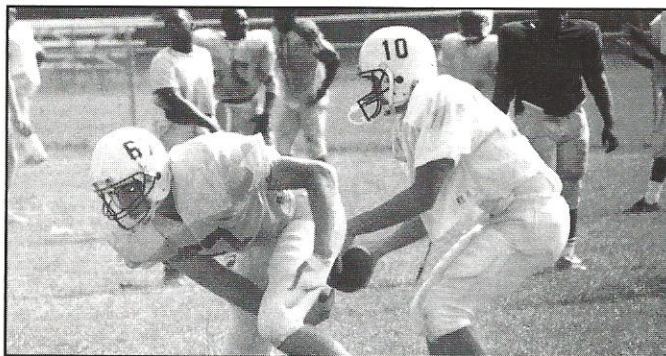
