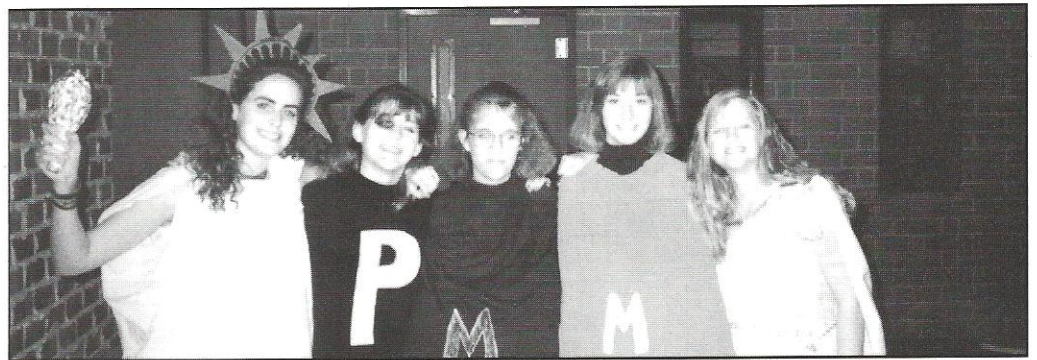
den telephones, these shady guys strutted their stuff.
