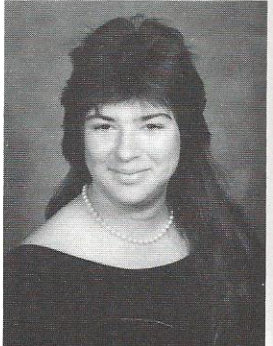
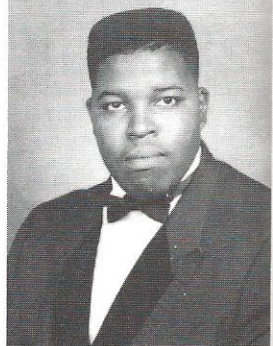
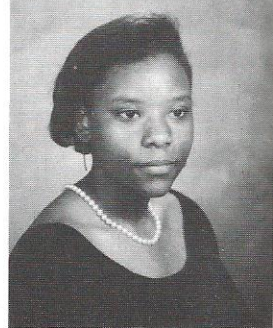




These seniors each scored over 1000 on the SAT. Their names were placed on a plaque in the vocational hall.
