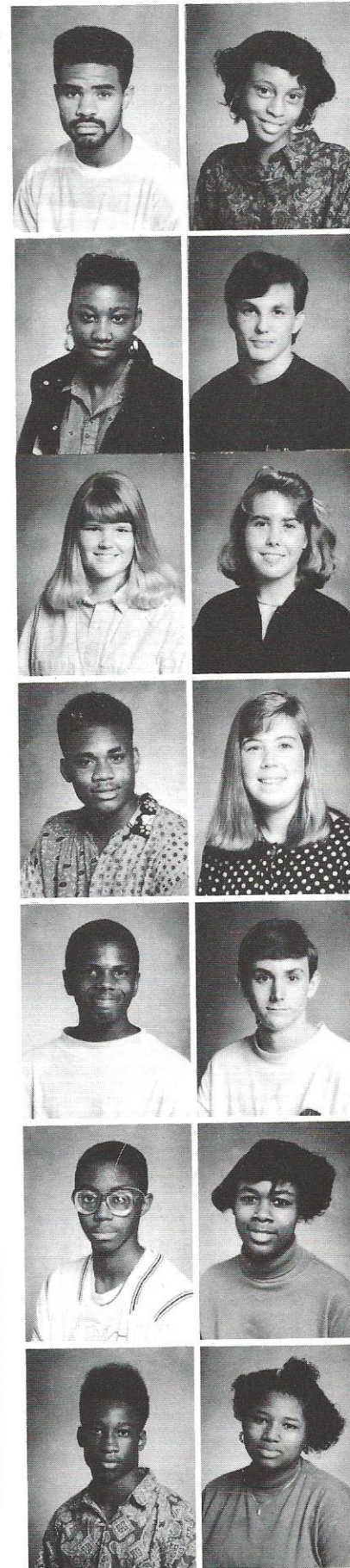
Sophomores knew their way around and were more comfortable in the high school setting. "Now that I've gotten through my freshman year I can have fun," said Travis Bell.
