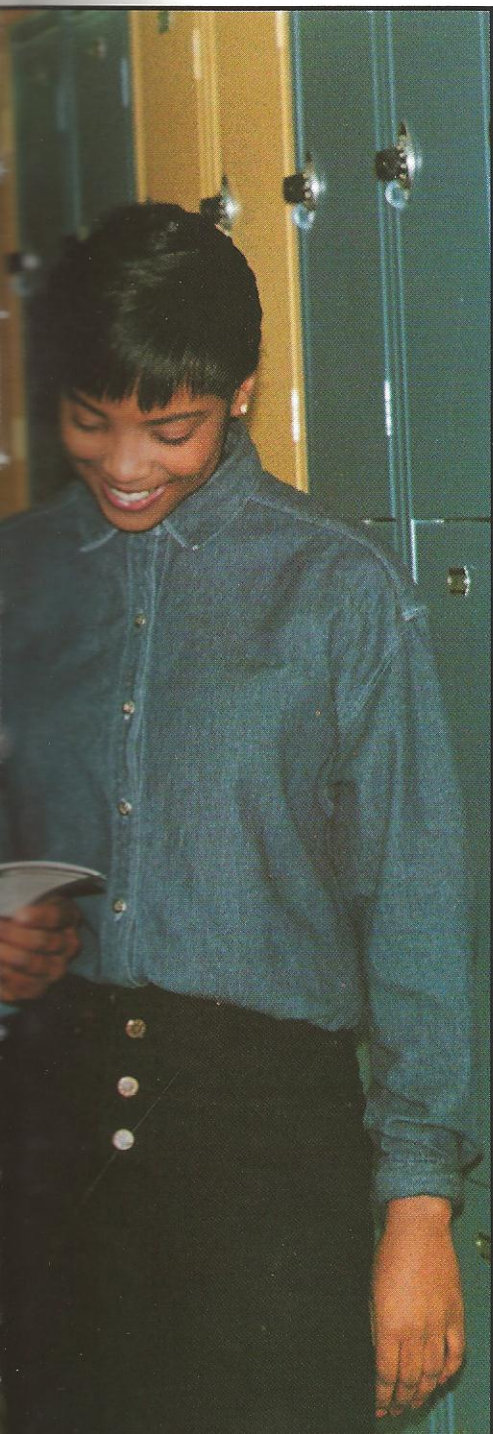


Karyn Davis wears a short multi-colored sweater with shorts. Karyn served as a *Press and Standard* student correspondent.

put forth a message of racial harmony that many students displayed.

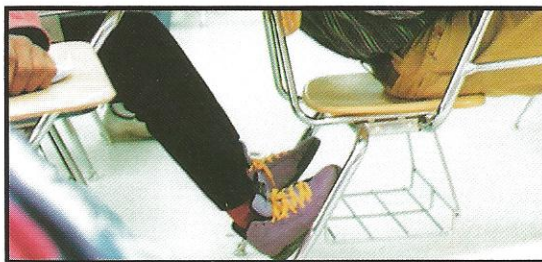
Other apparel that was big among students was
