Tony worked actively on the journalism staff. He was the assistant feature editor of the newspaper and the assistant editor for the People Section of the yearbook.

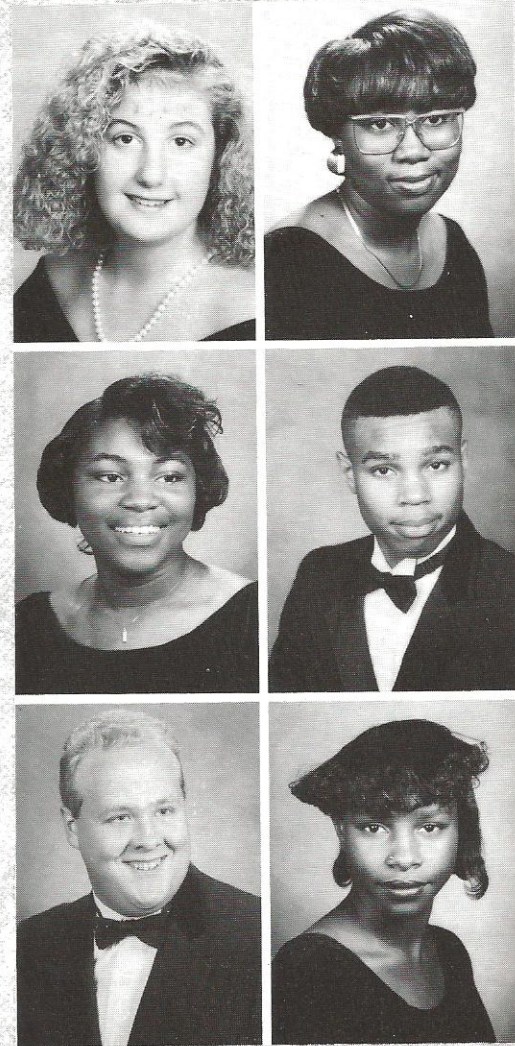
"A conscientious person should exceed the boundaries of what is required," said Tony. His aspirations included attending Winthrop University with plans to study in the Pre-Med program.
