History-Making Events

Three men — George Bush, Bill Clinton, and Ross Perot manned their battle stations on October 11, 1992, to prepare for the first Presidential Debate of the year. One of these men would become the leader that would hold together future generations.

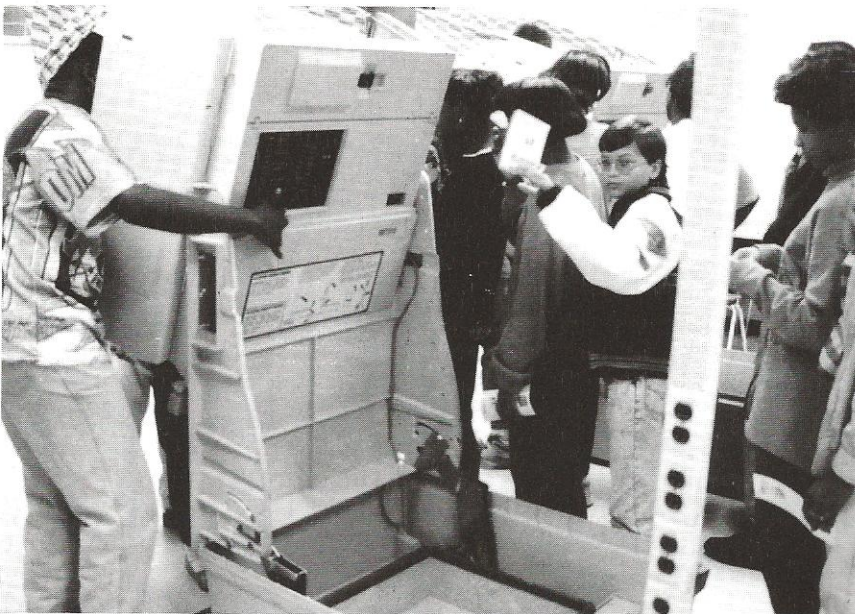
On November 3, 1992, Governor Bill Clinton and his running mate, Senator Al Gore, defeated former President George Bush, along with Vice-president Dan Quayle, and Ross Perot with running mate Admiral James Stockdale to win the election. Clinton received 380 electoral votes. Bush received 170 electoral votes and Perot did not receive any.

Many students wished that they were old enough to vote in the

election. They felt that their vote could have made a difference in the results. These students almost got their wish. The CHANNEL ONE NEWS sponsored a "mock" election poll throughout the nationwide schools on October 29, 1992. Students used real voting machines to cast their ballot. The results of the "mock" election were as follows: Clinton, 56 percent, Perot, 38 percent, and Bush, 6 percent.

"It was very exciting voting for the first time in a Presidential election," said Senior Hugh Wilson. "Even though my candidate did not win, I feel proud that I exercised my right to vote."
