All in all, more students participated in spirit week, going all out on many days, showing their "true blue."






Disadvantages also played a big role in the picture! Senior Lucas Nettles said,







What did students do on Friday nights? Around here, people went to the movies, to parties, hunted, or to football games.





"I like my room because it brings


out my personality," said freshman Tiffany Lewis.






There's More to the South than Grits and Dixie


Different types of movies appealed to all teenagers. Horror, romance, comedy, and drama fit anyone's personality.

"I love comedy movies. I like to see this type of movie because I like to laugh while I watch them," said sophomore Andrea Richardson.




Music

Music, a form of art, an expression of someone's emotions. It gave teenagers a way to relate with what was going on in the world.


Music seemed to be everywhere. Teens listened to it at home, in their cars and watched it on television. Music was a large part of teenagers lives.

Money


Money seemed to really made the world go round for some. More and more students started working this year. Without it life seemed virtually impossible.



Ouch! Barrel racing caused many injuries, but Erin Driggers rode on.




Erin qualified for the National Barrel Horse Association Youth World Finals. She placed third in the South Carolina second division.





Get away from me freak!!! What are you...obsessed?? Obsessions vary in all colors, shapes, and sizes. From football to cars, students thrived on many different items.




"A role model is someone you can look up to for support and that you can admire," said Sophmore Jenna Burkett.







A huge part of growing up was making friends that would not always be kept, however, the memories that were made would last a life time.



"The Thunderbolt Career and Technology Center is an excellent learning experience for students, and prepares students for the transaction from school to work," said senior Trey Murdaugh.




being in class all day at journalism camp, but in the end, everything I learned made it worth going," said junior Shantel Middleton.

A lot of hard work and determination went into these literary works, but the journalism staff prided themselves in setting the memories that will last a life time.








show was a lot of hard work, but after all the practicing you get the hang of it. I really loved marching and enjoyed this year's show." said sophomore Kveshia Robinson.

"The puppets and the colorquard's new look gave the band an added effect," said freshman Shanta Bright.







Chorus Students Take It to a Higher Note










"I love little kids, and being a Pediatric Physical Therapist will be a very interesting and rewarding career," said sophmore Christine Harris when asked about her future career choice.


Christine planned on attending Medical University of South Carolina in Charleston, because they maintained a great physical therapy program.







"What I miss most about home is my friends and going out to night clubs with them," Luiz informed the journalism staff.


He found the football games to be his best memories of the United States. Football games generated a lot of Luiz's classmates, so he found them to be one of the most interesting things in Walterboro.





activities to show their excellent abilities.





grow, did.





Volleyball was a sport that required absolute dedication. "Volleyball games can get real tense. The competition during our matches is unlike any other sport that I have ever played," Ashley said.



"I decided to play basketball because I have big dreams, to go to college. By playing basketball, I migh just get a scholarship for college," said sophmore Shay Jones.



Players exerted themselves fully to be a part of the basketball squad. The players who made the cut knew what it took and gave it no less than their best. These players would eventually lead this team to victory.


"During try-outs, I realized that to make the Junior Varsity basketball team took hard work, communication, practice, and determination," said sophomore Jarel Frazier.
